Awards Presented At Annual Ayrshire Breeders Field Day

The Prince Edward Island Ayrshire Breeders took full advantage of the sun's kindly rays yesterday afternoon as they held their annual field day on the farm of A. MacRae and Sons, Central Royalty.

Among the features of the gathering was the presentation of seven production certificates to Island breeders and the presentation of a plaque to Mr. John W. Lewis of Freetown.

Mr. Lewis was awarded the plaque for his ownership of the highest junior two-year producer in Canada during 1954. The presentation was made by Mr. M. R. Bell of Cornerbrook, Newfoundland.

The Ayrshire breeders were also the first group to hear Hon. Eugene Cullen since his appointment this week as Minister of Agriculture. Mr. Cullen spoke briefly at the opening of the meeting.

The production certificates were presented by Mr. Fred Clark, national director of the Canadian Ayrshire Breeders. One Gold Seal certificate was presented to the Experimental Farm for production of over 100,000 pounds.

Silver certificates for production of more than 75,000 pounds were presented to the following: John W. Freetown (two); K. W. Anderson, St. Peter's Bay; Earl MacRae, North Westshore; Experimental Farm; George Matheson, Wheatley River; A. G. Snyder, assistant superintendent at the National R.O.P. Office, spoke on the use being made of R.O.P. and Herbert McCharles, District Livestock Fieldman for New Brunswick and Nova Scotia also spoke.

Stewart Wright, Deputy Minister of Agriculture, recalled that in his many years with the Department he always found cattle breeders an excellent group to work with.

He stated that regulations would have to be made concerning the movement of cattle from one area to another and he urged that all purebred breeders act as ambassadors of goodwill so that tests for Bang's disease would be made by every farmer in the Province. Mr. Wright also asked the group to have no hesitancy in bringing their problems to his Department.

Mr. L. W. Roper, livestock fieldman with the Federal Department of Agriculture, spoke highly of the new system of grading sires.

He expressed pleasure at being present for the field day and told the group he had received a phone call in the morning from Donald Johnston, Peters Road sending along the best wishes of the Guernsey Breeders. He also brought the best wishes of the Canadian Guernsey Breeders Association to the meeting.

Following the speeches the breeders watched a demonstration of classification. Luncheon was served at noon on MacRae's lawn.

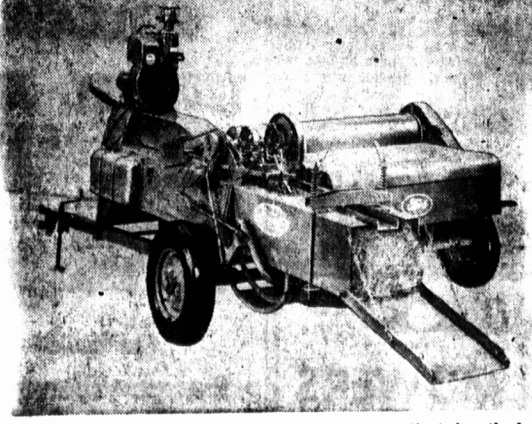

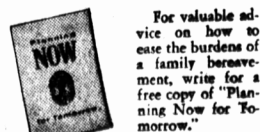
