Power Packed Board For New Car Company

One of the most power-packed boards of directors to be seen in Canada in a long time was announced last week-in charge of a company which so far has been set up only as a distributing agent for Japanese cars.

THE DIRECTORATE of Canadian Motor Industries Ltd., tasked a press conference of plans for large exports, but no definite information on these aspects were given.

AS MUCH AS NEEDS

Giving an idea of the new company's hopes, Frank McMahon said the company has capitalization of \$50,000,000. It can get as much as it needs.

The company will start distributing Isuzu and Toyota cars in January. Directors said they will aim for the market now served by German, Italian, British and French cars.

General Motors has only just swung back into production at its giant Oshawa plant following a month-long shut down because of a strike at GM in the United States, but there now is a possibility production may start again.

This will happen if the company and the United Automobile Workers' America (UAW) bargaining agent for some 22,000 Canadian workers can agree on terms on a new contract.

Meanwhile, UAW membership negotiations have entered the conciliation stage with a hearing to be held in the near future. Several UAW members on the board's report the union is legally allowed to call a strike.

COULD HIT FORD

The strike could affect Canadian plants if the progressive government's strike effect cannot be determined yet, but close checks in sales of new cars continued.

PLAN PIPELINE

Elsewhere on the business scene, Trans Canada Pipe Lines Ltd., seeking government permission to construct a 980-mile pipeline through part of the province.

W. Kerr, Trans-Canada's president, said the pipeline, which would be constructed in sections, would carry 800,000 cubic feet of gas a day and would be aimed at supplying much-needed potential in Eastern Canada.

However, the company also apparently has its eye on a piece of the U.S. market in the area through which the line would pass.

If approval from Ottawa and the Federal Power Commission in the U.S. is granted, construction could start in early 1966 and be finished later that year.

Retraction Is Sought By Newsmen

QUEBEC (CP) - The Syndical des Journalistes de Quebec, a union representing newspaper men and public relations men, has asked those who have published statements in a recent directive on handling news.

Element Tardif, president of the union affiliated with the Quebec Press Association, announced that unless the two newspapers pub-

lish the requested retraction by Nov. 10, the union will take legal action for damages. He said notice to that effect has been served on the newspapers' management.

Last week the two dailies issued instructions to their newsroom staffs to limit in prominence and ban some news about separatism, nationalism and protests against established government.

The union noted in the newspapers said that the instructions issued after the Queen's visit to Quebec Oct. 10-11, accused the journalists of "complicity and extremism and separatism."

The union described the statements as "injurious and humiliating."

Mr. Tardif said that, in addition to the demand for a retraction, the union has made the directive a grievance under labor contract procedure.

The Oct. 22 directive banned publication of statements of "yellow journalism and nationalism, nationalism and other groups or persons; and of protests against established authority or groups considered not representative of the public interest."
