THE VISIT OF MGR. FALCONIO A Grand Reception Last Night

CATHOLIC SOCIETIES TURN OUT
—ADDRESSES PRESENTED.

Service in the Cathedral—Band
Music—Dinner To-Day.

The welcome accorded His Excellency
Mgr. Falconio last night was on a magni-
ficent scale, and His Lordship Bishop
Macdonald, the Cathedral clergy and the
reception committee are to be congrat-
ulated. The weather was fine and great
crowds of people turned out.

At eight o'clock the members of the
League of the Cross, headed by their band,
left their hall on Prince Street and pro-
ceeded to the hall of the Benevolent Irish
Society, where they were joined by that
organization and the band of the Fourth
Regiment. The two societies then came
down Queen Street to the meeting room of
the Ancient Order of Hibernians and the
C. M. B. A., where these societies
joined the procession and the whole,
under the direction of Chief Marshal
Charles Hermans, proceeded to the wharf
where they lined up to await the arrival
of the Princess.

The steamer arrived about nine o'clock,
and His Excellency, with his Secretary,
Father Fisher, and Rev. Dr. Morrison,
entered a barouche and taking their place
in the procession were conducted to the
Palace, where, at the main entrance, Bis-
hop Macdonald welcomed the distinguished
prelate to the diocese and received from
him the kiss of peace. His Lordship
then repaired to the Cathedral and when
His Excellency had put off his travelling
apparel and vested in magna capa and
biretta he was conducted in solemn pro-
cession through the lined streets to the
Cathedral by the clergy. At the door of
the church the Bishop, in cope and
mitre, met him and presented him
with the crucifix to kiss. Then he
blessed the people with holy water, was
incensed in turn, and proceeded to the
sanctuary, the Bishop occupying a
prie diu on the right and the delegate
standing before the high altar. After
the usual prayer and the chanting by the
choir of *Ecce Sacerdos Magnus*, Rev.
Dr. Morrison read the following clerical
address of welcome at the foot of the
throne to which the delegate had in the
meantime been conducted:

YOUR EXCELLENCY:—On this occasion

Holiness as the supreme visible pastor of
souls. We are happy to greet Your
Excellency as the august representative of
an illustrious Pontiff, and to honor your
presence with every mark of esteem and
affection that may emanate from the minds
and hearts of the faithful of our holy
Mother Church. To Your Excellency,
then, as the representative of the Vicar of
Christ upon earth and successor of him
to whom our Divine Lord personally deliv-
ered the keys of the Kingdom of
Heaven, do we on this joyous occasion
give assurance of our loving attachment
to that sacred deposit of faith which the
Saviour conveyed to the safe-keeping
of His Church, with the divine commis-
sion to preach to all nations.

We assure Your Excellency that our
deep devotion to the Apostolic See receives
a signal mark of encouragement and con-
solation from the presence of your illus-
trious person amongst us, and we shall
ever remember with sentiments of deep
gratitude the favor you have conferred
upon us by visiting us in our Island
home. We hope your visit to the Diocese
of Charlottetown will be a source of
pleasure to Your Excellency, that your
impressions of our country and its people
will be of a most favorable nature, and
that in the designs of an all-wise Provi-
dence your residence in our fair Dominion
will be long and happy.

Respectfully requesting Your Excellency
to convey to the Holy Father the expres-
sion of our sincere affection for, and at-
tachment to, the Apostolic See, and beg-
ging you to impart to us all the Apostolic
Benediction,

Chief Justice Sullivan then stepped for-
ward from the committee and, just with-
out the rails, read the following address
from the laity:—

To His Excellency The Most Reverend
Diomeo Falconio, Archbishop of
Larissa, Apostolic Delegate:

YOUR EXCELLENCY.—We, the congrega-
tion of St. Dunstan's Cathedral, descend-
ents of the pioneers of our holy faith in
this province, greet Your Excellency
upon your arrival in our midst, with a joy
exceeding great. We feel, as we never
before felt, the inadequacy of words at our
command to express the deep sense of
heart-felt gratitude which now animates
us upon the arrival in our community of
so distinguished and illustrious a person-
age as Your Excellency.

We honor Your Excellency, and we ex-
tend to you personally a most hearty and
generous welcome upon your advent to our
Island Province,—a welcome which is
greatly enhanced on account of the emi-
nent ecclesiastical positions which you
have so worthily fulfilled in the past;
but especially do we honor you as Ap-
ostolic Delegate and the representative of
our Holy Father Pope Leo XIII, now so
beneficently guiding the Church of God
from the chair of St. Peter.

While not wishing to claim for ourselves
that we have been over-zealous in pre-
serving the jewel of our holy faith confi-
ded to us by our forefathers, we neverthe-
less feel a pardonable pride in having
erected and now carrying on to completion
a Cathedral suitable for the worship of
God, on a site once occupied by a small
and unpretentious chapel.

We embrace the present opportunity of
giving expression to the unanimity that
has always existed among our coreligion-
ists in this Province, as also to the good
feeling which so happily exists among all
classes of our civil community.

Be pleased, Your Excellency, to accept
our best wishes for yourself personally;
and we pray that long life and health may
be granted you by the Divine Dispenser of
every best and every perfect gift; so that
you may long continue to render assistance
to all that relates to the welfare of God's
Holy Church. In fine, we respectfully re-
quest Your Excellency to convey to the
Holy Father the expression of our sincere
attachment and devotion to the One,
Holy, Catholic and Apostolic faith, and
our earnest prayer that he may long be
enabled to rule the Church with that un-
erring wisdom which has ever character-
ized him in the discharge of the duties of
the Apostolic office.

When both addresses had been formally
presented the Apostolic Delegate arose and

without notes or reference made a most
eloquent and appropriate reply. He spoke
of the pleasure it afforded him, as repre-
sentative of the Holy Father, Leo
XIII, in Canada, to come to the diocese
of Charlottetown, the faith and virtue of
whose people he had heard much about.
He dwelt upon the necessity of religion in
an extended argument, showed how Peter
had been made chief of the Apostles
to safeguard it on earth, succeeded as he
was in this mission by a long and unbrok-
en line of two hundred and sixty-four
pontiffs. Where Peter was there was the
Church. He vindicated the Roman Pon-
tiff's right to the esteem and reverence of
christendom, and then said he was here
in Canada to help spread the Kingdom of
Christ upon earth. He enlivened the
clergy and laity of the diocese, and com-
mended the large-spiritedness which had
erected so beautiful a cathedral here
which he exhorted all to make generous
efforts to complete and equip. He then
gave the Apostolic Benediction.

Mgr. Falconio speaks with a strong
Italian accent, but is very fluent, graceful
and effective in English speech. He was
assisted on the throne by Mgr. James
McDonald and Rev. Dr. Doyle. His
Lordship Bishop McDonald was assisted
on his throne by Revs. A. E. Burke
and Dr. Monaghan.

The beautiful services at the cathedral
were then terminated with solemn Bene-
diction of the Blessed Sacrament, Mgr.
Falconio officiating, Revs. D. M. McDonald
and Stephen Phelan being the deacons.
At the close the procession of clergy re-
formed and conducted the delegate back to
the palace.

The musical portion of the service was
under the direction of Mr. Blanchard, and
the music was of the best description.
The choir was assisted by Miss Maisie
Coady with the violin, Professor Vinni-
combe with the clarinet, and the League
of the Cross band reinforced by Drs.
Maloney and Kennedy. A distinct feature
of the singing was Mrs. Byrne's rendering
of the "Ave Maria" with violin and organ
accompaniment. The duet by Miss Josie
Smith and Mr. Charles Hermans was also
exceptionally well rendered.

The church was thronged during the
service, and hundreds of people were un-
able to gain admission. The decorations
of the altar were exquisite, the electric
lights harmonizing with the tapers and
beautiful flowers. The decorations of the
sanctuary and the body of the church
were also beautiful. Over the main en-
trance, after passing the vestibule, en-
twined in the Union Jack, was the word
"Welcome."

The Palace and grounds were
brilliantly lighted, and the tents of the
Fourth Regiment and the League
of the Cross furnished some choice
music. Notwithstanding the late hour
hundreds of people lingered about the
place until the bands left for home.

NOTES.

To-day His Lordship Bishop Macdonald
entertained His Excellency and the visit-
ing clergy at dinner at the Palace. This
evening, from 7.30 until 9.30 a reception
will be held.

His Excellency will remain in Char-
lottetown until Saturday next, when he
proceeds to St. John where he will also
be well received.

As the Princess came up to the wharf
last night the Grand Duchesse made a
splendid display of its powerful search-
light illuminating the harbor and water-
front for quite a distance.

The lighting of the Cathedral and the
Palace grounds was exceedingly well done.
The Royal Electric Company lighted the
grounds and placed a handsome chandelier
in the Cathedral. The Full Electric Com-
pany put a beautiful lamp in the church.

HYDRANT BURSTS.—Yesterday afternoon
the hydrant at the corner of Prince and
Fitzroy streets burst from a sudden pressure
of water striking the top and forcing it off.
The water then shot up into the air to a
great height, almost as high as the Baptist
Church spire. It was some time before
repair men from the water department
arrived, when the hydrant was quickly re-
paired.
