WASHINGTON, July 24 (AP)—Deep in military headquarters here is a command post, manned continuously now, from which the air war will be directed if Russian bombers head for United States cities.

A battery of direct-line telephones link the post with the warning networks, fighter and bomber bases and headquarters of the air force. Instant contact can be made with any of them. Officials who showed the layout to a reporter also described its operation.
