

Problem Of National Club Could Possibly Be Solved

KEMPTVILLE, Ont. (CP)—Canadian fans no longer become violent when Russia wins an international hockey tournament. But the first Russian victory in 1954 upstaged a mighty roar from hockey fans in the country.

Much of the shouting was directed against the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, which sends the teams overseas, and W. R. Baldy George, then CAHA president.

George, who says he's "well over 65," retired from hockey four years after the Soviet victory. He teaches agricultural classes in a high school near his Ottawa Valley home here.

The Toronto team which represented Canada in the 1954 tournament was an inexperienced one, George said in an interview.

"Only two of the players were in their mid-20s. The others were just out of junior ranks."

That convinced him that a junior team can't do the job for Canada in overseas assignments, George said.

This became clear early in the deciding game between Canada and Russia in the 1954 series.

DEFLATED BY GOAL
The Russians got a goal soon after the first period started. It was scored from just over the centre line. Our goalie was just too tense to handle the shot correctly. You could sense the whole team sagging after that."

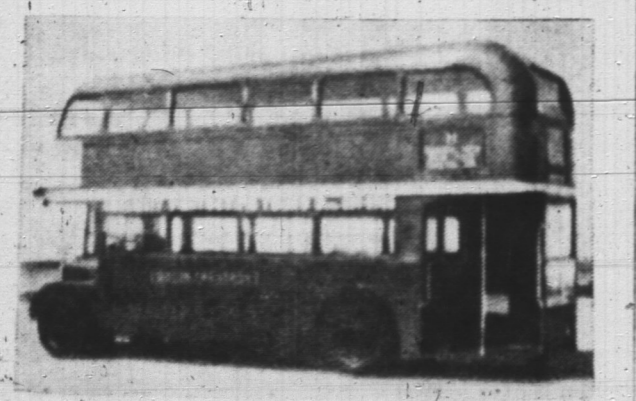

NEW YORK (AP)—Russ Snyder, a line drive hitter who bats just ahead of Frank Robinson in Baltimore Orioles' powerful batting order, has vaulted into first place in the American batting race.

Snyder collected five hits Sunday and nine hits in 18 trips over-all last week to lift his average 22 points to .338. The 32-year-old outfielder hit only 270 last season.

Frank Robinson, the leader a week ago, dropped into the runner-up position with a .332 mark. He slipped three points with a 9-for-29 performance last week.
