

Expect Free Trade Offer To Get 'Warming Over'

OTTAWA (CP)—A political hot potato—Britain's proposal for Anglo-Canada free trade—is bound to get another warming over in the Commons soon.

The issue had more or less died down in recent weeks until reporters asked British Prime Minister Macmillan about it at his Friday press conference here.

Mr. Macmillan replied that Britain stands by its proposal for an Anglo-Canada free trade area to be developed during the next 17 years.

"It may be an ideal," Mr. Macmillan said, "but it's on the table if anyone wants to take it up in whole or in part."

SEEMED BEST WAY

He said Britain had advanced the proposal because it seemed that the best way to fight communism was to increase the free world's trade and wealth.

LIBERALS PROD

The Liberals in the Commons have demanded repeatedly to know the government's attitude on the British suggestion.

The Progressive Conservatives have asked what the Liberals would do, to which Opposition Leader Pearson has replied that his party would give the matter careful consideration.

The government is obviously sensitive about the British proposal, particularly at a time when it has before it a recommendation of the tariff board for an increase in levies against United Kingdom woollens.

Mr. Diefenbaker on Friday

intervened to prevent a CBC reporter from asking Mr. Macmillan a question on the free trade suggestion in a recorded television interview.

QUESTION DODGED

Earlier, at the press conference, Mr. Macmillan had been asked the same question: Would the British proposal be discussed at the Commonwealth economic conference at Montreal in September?

Mr. Macmillan implied that it would be. But he dodged a direct question whether he and Mr. Diefenbaker had discussed it during last week's talks here.

There the matter rests, for the moment. But it seems unlikely that the Liberals will give the subject much rest between now and the Montreal conference—and after.
