## Montague Bans Sunday Skating

**MONTAGUE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
At a special meeting of the Montague Town Council, it was decreed that the skating rink would remain closed on Sundays.

The meeting was called following complaints received by the council due to the rink being used for skating the previous Sunday evening.

For the past several years a number of married couples have taken advantage of the short ice skating season by holding a skate on Sunday evenings. The skates have always been held following church services and with no admission. All married couples were welcomed and the doors were left open for this purpose.

Comments by one of the skaters included the statements that all complaints to the council should be put in writing, that complaints causing a special meeting of the council should be by citizens of the town, and that he felt that the skaters were being discriminated against as other infringements of the law could be found within the town itself on Sundays of which the council no doubt had knowledge. It was also pointed out that other rinks in the province had skating clubs which were active on Sunday evenings.

Following considerable discussion a vote was taken with the tally finding three votes against, two for and one abstained.

## Well Known Souris Lady Passes Sat.

Mrs. Annie McQuaid, mother of Hon. M. J. McQuaid, attorney-general and provincial treasurer, died Saturday at her home in Souris. She was 89. Her son is her only survivor. Her husband, John McQuaid predeceased her. She was the former Annie Mullally daughter of Valentine Mullally, Souris River.

## MINISTER HITS FRENCH COOKS

**LONDON (AP)** — Transport Minister Ernest Marples did nothing here to improve British-French relations. He said the famous French cooking is unhygienic — and claimed he knows this from experience.

Opening a hotel and caterers exhibition, Marples disclosed that he worked last year in the kitchen and waited tables at a plush Riviera Hotel.

Marples said he and his wife were spending a holiday last year cycling on the Riviera. As they are interested in good food, they hatched the idea of working in a French restaurant to see what cooked. Marples peeled potatoes, cooked them and dashed them off to the waiting clients. Said Marples:

"When the chef was out the staff stopped working. And they were tasting with their fingers every second.

This is the advice Marples was able to give British caterers after his French experience:

"The chefs should write their menus in French and English. Managers should send promising staff members for training."  
And the customers?  
"You should refuse lousy food."

## New Chief Surgeon At Royal Victoria Has P.E.I. Relatives

**MONTAGUE** — Dr. Lloyd MacLean, Calgary, associate professor of surgery at the University of Minnesota, has been appointed surgeon-in-chief at the Royal Victoria Hospital, Montreal. He is the son of Fred MacLean, formerly of Montague, now living in Calgary.

The announcement was made by Henry Morgan, president of the hospital, and Dr. F. Cyril James, principal and vice-chancellor of McGill University, on behalf of the boards of governors. The appointment as surgeon-in-chief and professor of surgery becomes effective June 1.

Dr. MacLean will succeed Dr. Donald R. Webster, who has been named professor of experimental surgery with the laboratories in the Donner Research Building at McGill.

## Whites Teaching Eskimos To Lie

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Members of the Northwest Territories council said here that white-style discipline meted out to Eskimo children is teaching them to lie.

The Eskimo parent never disciplines his child and "maybe his system has something," said member E. J. (Scotty) Gall of Yellowknife.

Under the Eskimo system, said Mr. Gall "brats" grow into "quiet young men."

The white system was teaching them to lie to get out of punishments they never knew in their own families.

## Director Named For Institute On Oceanography

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Appointment of William N. English, 46-year-old marine scientist, as director of the Bedford Institute of Oceanography at Dartmouth, N.S., was announced here by the mines department.

The \$4,000,000 research centre now is under construction. Dr. English is deputy superintendent of the Defence Research Board's Pacific naval laboratory at Esquimalt, B.C. He takes over his new mines department post April 15, heading a force of 300 scientists.

Born near Coleraine in Northern Ireland, he came to Canada as an infant. After studies at the University of British Columbia and the University of California he joined the Royal Canadian Navy in 1940.

During the Second World War Dr. English was a naval radar expert on loan to the Royal Navy and was in charge of radar for the invasion of Sicily.

He joined the National Research Council 13 years ago and won a steady list of promotions until his latest appointment. Dr. English will begin a lecture tour of Eastern Canada next week.

## Stove, Furnace Sales Sought To Europeans

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Canada will send a special trade mission to England and Europe next month to explore possibilities of heating overseas homes more efficiently with Canadian equipment.

The trade department has announced the home heating equipment mission will leave Feb. 9 to scout markets in Britain, The Netherlands, West Germany and France. The mission of heating industry specialists will familiarize themselves with specific requirements and try to determine whether they will have to face competition.

## Gen. Motors Report Profit

**DETROIT (AP)** — General Motors Corporation has reported an indicated net profit of \$893,000,000, or \$3.11 a share, for 1961. This compared with \$839,000,000, or \$3.35 a share, in 1960.

The net came on estimated sales of \$11,400,000,000, down from \$12,700,000,000 last year. General Motors said Thursday's announcement was a preliminary statement with final figures due late next month.

## Unemployment Policy Defended By Fulton

**OTTAWA (CP)** — Justice Minister Fulton has defended the Conservative government's four-year record in handling unemployment, saying it compares "very creditably" with that of the former Liberal administration.

"Heaven knows, we do not claim to have found all the answers or to have solved this problem," he said in the Commons throne speech debate.

## U.S. Charged Interfering In Canada

**MONTREAL (CP)** — David Maclellan, general manager of the Graphic Arts Industries Association, said here the United States government has been interfering in the Canadian magazine issue.

He said in a statement that "the unwarranted interference of the United States government in Canadian affairs connected with the work of the royal commission on publications comes with bad grace and should stop at once."

In Washington the U.S. State department said Prime Minister Diefenbaker's proposed action against non-Canadian magazines is neither proper nor practical.

Mr. Diefenbaker said earlier in the House of Commons legislation will be introduced to ban the entry of foreign magazines whose advertising is aimed mainly at the Canadian market and to allow a tax deduction on only half the cost of the advertising a Canadian client places in a non-Canadian magazine printed in Canada.

Mr. Maclellan said the printing and publishing industries in Canada have been crippled for nearly 40 years "by the vicious restrictions of the U.S. Copyright Act which, among other things, prevent us from shipping more than 1,500 copies of any one book to the U.S."

He said "the official spokesmen of the state department have little excuse to criticize Canadian methods."

## Canada Ponders Request By UN For Congo Team

**OTTAWA (CP)** — The government has been pondering a United Nations request that Canada send a small team of army officers to the Congo to help train the army of the central Congolese government, it is learned authoritatively.

Such a commitment would be entirely different to and separate from Canada's contingent of about 400 soldiers and airmen serving with the 15,000-member UN Congo force.

The UN request was received some months ago. It is understood that the defence department has opposed it. Because no action has been taken to date it is considered probable that the department's view will prevail.

The number of officers who would be involved is believed small—a dozen or so.
