Try New Method In Militia Training At Camp Gagetown

CAMP GAGETOWN N. B. — (CP) — Arrival of 600 militia members from Quebec Province for the first week of summer training here has launched an experiment that permanent staff officers think may revolutionize military training methods.

For the first time militia units are having their training integrated with that of regular army units at Canada's largest military camp. The new system was designed to promote a more uniform standard of instruction than under the previous separate courses.

Says Canadian Navy Could Use 12 Nuclear Subs

OTTAWA (CP)—Vice-Admiral Harry DeWolf, chief of naval staff, says the navy could make effective use now of some 12 nuclear submarines to exercise present Canadian anti-submarine forces.

He said in an interview that if the navy had these vessels Wednesday it could put them to full and immediate work training the destroyer fleet and the RCAF's Maritime Air Command.

The RCN employs three British subs at Halifax for training of naval ships and aircraft, and planes of the Maritime Air Command. These subs are partly manned by Canadian sailors trained in Britain. However, they provide only a small part of the training requirements, which are increasing as new ships and new Argus aircraft join the Maritime forces.

Admiral DeWolf said it will be "two years or more" before Canada could be ready to start construction of nuclear subs.

An active study of the nuclear submarine now is under way and the recommendations to be made eventually will depend on the results of that study. There is at present no firm program for the construction of such vessels in Canada.

The admiral made it clear that the possible eventual inclusion of nuclear subs would not alter the need for surface ships in the Royal Canadian Navy.

"I don't foresee any change in the requirement for surface ships," he said, as he spoke frankly to a reporter about Canada's navy of the future. Though in Mufti, he could not be taken for anybody but an admiral.

These surface vessels, which are fitted for fuel replenishment at sea, will require support from tankers fast enough that they could operate without escort. All RCN ships are practised in fueling at sea from British and American naval tankers.

Tanker support would enable destroyers to remain on station far out from Canada's coasts to prevent missile-launching submarines coming within range of Canadian ports—or inland cities.

Admiral DeWolf said Russia has a "vast number" of submarines and that it must be assumed it could do at least as well as the U.S. in the launching of missiles from subs. The U.S. has already carried out such launches.

"We must assume," he said, "that Russia will be able to launch missiles of a range of 1,500 miles from submarines." This was an infinitely better weapon than the intercontinental ballistic missile because a submarine had great flexibility and mobility, and required no fixed base. This missile could reach almost any target in the world, and could arrive from a completely unexpected direction.

"This is a new threat," the admiral said.

It was "beginning to look" as if the best way to find and destroy a submarine might be with another submarine.

Admiral DeWolf said construction of nuclear-propelled submarines in Canada would depend on technical assistance received from the United States and Britain.

He added that he expects that this technical assistance would be forthcoming when needed. Furthermore, Canada had built submarines before.

Admiral DeWolf did not go into the matter of costs but it has been estimated that a nuclear submarine costs about \$50,000,000. A program for 12 would run into 600,000,000.

He said he was impressed by the simplicity of operation of the U.S. nuclear submarines. The atomic reactor was sealed off from the rest of the ship and operation of the vessel was much the same as for any submarine. Any engineering required for up-keeping of the reactor was done during refit in harbor.

Admiral DeWolf said the navy will have to be able to operate far out to sea, week in, week out.

N. Y. Stocks Spring To High For '58
NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market made a slow start last week but finished with a sprint to peaks for 1958.

It was the market's fourth straight weekly advance and its best in three weeks.

The advance brought the market through a difficult resistance area, represented by the level of 470 in the Dow Jones average. By the end of the week this average stood at a 1958 high of 474.77.

The Associated Press average of 60 stocks was at a fresh peak for this year of \$174.30, having risen \$1.20 to its highest point since last Sept.

The first Covent Garden theatre, taking its name from the produce market next door, was built in 1732 and destroyed by fire in 1808. A second house, opened in 1809, met a similar fate in 1856.
The present Victorian building, with its giant Corinthian portico, was completed two years later. With its auditorium of crimson and gold, seating about 2,200, it is regarded as one of the finest opera houses in Europe.
The actual centenary fell May 15 but Tuesday night was the official celebration.
Covent Garden first earned world fame with international seasons that reached a zenith in the Edwardian era with such stars as Melba, Caruso and Tulliani. Diaghilev's Ballets Russes were the sensation of 1911.
The First World War ended this period and Covent Garden became a furniture storage house. For a time after the war movies, revues and even prize fights were held there.
The curtain dropped once more for the duration of the Second World War when the theatre became a dance hall for troops on leave in London.
With the war ended, Covent Garden's fortunes rose again.
