## Campbell Says Fiscal Deal Is 'Best Ever'

The net result of the Ottawa fiscal conference as far as Prince Edward Island is concerned is an increase of 4.1 million dollars over last year. In a press release last night, Premier Alex Campbell noted this fact and added: "Although we had asked for more, I would point out that this arrangement is the best arrangement ever received by our province and represents an increase of almost double the amount we received under any previous adjustment. We welcomed the announcement of Prime Minister Pearson that a special grant of \$3,500,000 would be made to the province. At the same time the Prime Minister announced an additional grant for education for P.E.I. amounting to over \$1,500,000 which represents an increase for educational purposes of approximately \$500,000."

**STRONGER POSITION**  
The premier said that with this additional financial aid from Ottawa, the government is now in a much stronger position to meet its fiscal commitments. "We are naturally exploring every possible avenue for additional financial help from the federal government, and its agencies, and we are encouraging the province. At the same time the Prime Minister announced an additional grant for education for P.E.I. amounting to over \$1,500,000 which represents an increase for educational purposes of approximately \$500,000."

## Highway Deaths Up Almost 50 Per Cent Here

An increase of close to 50 per cent occurred in highway fatalities in Prince Edward Island this year compared to the same 10 months in 1965.

To date, 29 people have been killed on Island highways in 23 separate accidents, compared to 21 killed in 1965 in 20 separate accidents.

The highest yearly fatality rate occurred in 1964 when a total of 35 persons were killed on the Island.

Motorists are warned that the months of November and December are normally the most dangerous ones, and that they should exercise every possible precaution.

## Acadian Film To Be Partly Shot On P.E.I.

Part of an hour-long film documentary on contemporary Acadian life will be filmed in Prince Edward Island. The National Film Board production is being written and directed by Len Forest, a native of Moncton, N.B.

The film will also probe into the Cheticamp area of Cape Breton, go through the Annapolis Valley and into Louisiana, as well as include footage shot in Caracquet and the Belledune area in New Brunswick.

The film crew arrived in Moncton Wednesday night to film Canadian National's shops and the Electronic Classification Yard.

Working sessions on international affairs, "Canadian nationhood and education will occupy Saturday afternoon and Sunday morning. "Charlottetown II" will close Sunday with a plenary session to report the progress of each group and open the conference to general debate.

Mark McGuigan is a law professor who is the son of Justice and Mrs. Mark R. McGuigan of Charlottetown. He was the unsuccessful candidate in Queens during the last federal election.
