There will be an evangelical meeting in the Presbyterian Church at Mount Stewart, on Tuesday, August 31st, at 7 1/2 o'clock, at which addresses will be delivered by Rev. Messrs. THE DRUMMOND COLLEGE RELIEF FUND.—The fourth annual report of the Central committee for this fund shows that the output during the year ending 12th of May last was \$1,630.50, leaving a balance of \$1,506.84 in hand. This amount will not be sufficient to give relief another year unless the scale is reduced, and this the committee think is not practicable, as the aid now given is so small that to reduce it would destroy its usefulness. The approaching depletion of the relief treasury is not unexpected by the recipients. Many of them, says the report, appear to be doing what they can to prepare for the day of its entire exhaustion.

THE MONTREAL TROUBLES.—A witness is said to have turned up in Montreal who is in a position to identify Hackett's murderer. The City Council of Montreal have offered a reward of \$500, and two Oranges, men of the same city a further reward of \$200 for information that will convict the murderer.

THE FIRE LAST NIGHT.—At twenty minutes past eleven last night there was an alarm of fire. A new building at the north end of the city—the property of Mr. James Jones, Messenger for the Provincial offices—was in flames. The Hook-and-Ladder Company, under command of Captain Butcher, were on the ground as soon as possible under the circumstances; and the building was speedily levelled. Fortunately it was detached, and the night was very calm, or we might this morning be called upon to report a very serious fire. The building was new, unfinished, unoccupied, and carefully locked; and there is scarcely a doubt that the fire was the work of an incendiary. Mr. Jones had invested his all, and labored hard in the erection of "a house of his own." The loss is therefore, for him, very heavy. At the fire there were many expressions of indignation at the incendiary act and of sympathy with Mr. Jones. We trust that steps will be taken to capture and bring the incendiary to justice. The tools of the workmen engaged at the building were burnt—with the exception of two saws.

### GOVERNOR GENERAL'S TRIP.

It is understood that their Excellencies will leave Ottawa for Manitoba about the last of this week. Besides the staff they will be accompanied by Hon. J. E. Cauchon and Hon. David Mills. The newspaper correspondents are gathering at Toronto and a representative of the "Illustrated London News" is expected by Allan steamer. The Canadian route to Manitoba—viz, the Dawson road, running from Prince Arthur's Landing, on the north shore of Lake Superior, through the water-stretches—was closed early this season by the Dominion Government, the cost of maintenance being sadly out of proportion to the number of emigrants carried. The vice-regal party will therefore take the Duluth or Proctor Knott route—steamer from Collingwood, on the Georgian Bay, to Duluth; thence by the Northern Pacific to Moorehead, and down the Red River by Kilson's steamer to Winnipeg, which will probably be reached by August 5. Until Winnipeg is reached no official programme for the tour in the northwestern country can be prepared. It is known, however, that besides the rounds of receptions, inaugurations, &c, at Winnipeg, their Excellencies will visit the Mennonite settlement at Red River, and that on the west side of Red River, near the Dakota line; the Iceland settlement on Lake Manitoba; the northwest seat of Government at Battleford, and other points of interest in the extreme west. Flat-bottomed boats of light draught will take them down the main or south branch of the Wan or Kisis-kah-che-wun (the mighty river that runs swift), and the Dominion Mounted Police will be reviewed, probably at Fort Pelly. Reports from Winnipeg say that preparations for their Excellencies' reception are already being made there under the direction of the Local Government, and the Mayor and City Council. The vice-regal party expect to be back at Rideau Hall by the third week in September.
