Fireworks Missing As Commons Meets

OTTAWA (CP)—The players were in their places, the curtain went up and the familiar Commons stage was set Friday for the first political skirmish of the new Parliament.

Although most of the key characters took part in the 45-minute performance, the capacity audience went away generally disappointed. The fireworks everyone had waited for didn't go off.

The occasion was the first question period of the 25th Parliament which had its ceremonial opening Thursday.

By the rules, the question period is a time for queries of urgent national interest. By practice, however, MPs attempt to pry information from cabinet ministers or display their skill in needle-pointing the government.

Speaker Marcel Lambert, the bilingual lawyer from Edmonton West who was unanimously elected Speaker at Thursday's session, served notice right at the start that he intends to keep members' questions strictly within the rules.

Following the question period two new government backbenchers carried out the preliminaries which set in motion the eight-day throne speech debate, which will be launched Monday.

Chinese Admit Opposition Inside And Outside Party
