**Growing in Self-Discipline**

**ILLUSTRATED SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON**

Scripture—1 Corinthians 9:24-27; 10:12-14; 1 Peter 4:1-5.



Like well-trained athletes, Christians should employ method in attaining a Christ-like life, keeping our bodies in complete subjection to our spiritual wills.—1 Corinthians 9:24-27.

All Christians are tempted, but not beyond our ability to resist. God either strengthens us to bear temptation, or opens an escape to moral safety.—1 Corinthians 10:12-14.

Though free of sin's bondage, Christians should conduct themselves in a manner that glorifies God, uplifts and betters the lives of those around them.—Corinthians 10:23-33.

Through Christ we died to sin in His death, but at the same time we are alive to God in His resurrection.—1 Peter 4:1-5.

**MORAL TRIUMPH**

**Learning To Live Christian Life**

Hardly any lesson on personal conduct, derived from New Testament teachings, could be more important than this one on self-discipline and self-denial, because we are living in an era of relative ease, of a shrinking from hardship and discipline, and displaying an indifference to the consequences of our carelessness in unrighteous matters and practices.

There can be no moral growth without this self-discipline and self-denial, for these are chief factors in learning to live a Christian life. We do not simply drift into righteous living. It

does not come as a natural fringe benefit of being a Christian. Moral triumph is achieved only at the expense of great effort. It costs something to live the pure, upright Christian life, for it is not something to be had for the asking.

The background of much of today's lesson is the vigorous athletic life and national contests of the Greek-speaking people of Paul's day, which the Apostle uses as a basis for his commands and admonitions.

Some Christians, in their spiritual lives, are like runners who pay no attention to the course they are to run; or like boxers who flail the air without aiming their blows. Nothing is accomplished. The effort is vain.

Instead, Paul advises, we should employ method in our strivings toward the Christ-like life. We should choose our course carefully and follow it, keeping our earthly bodies in subjection to our spiritual wills. Should we fail and fall into subjection to the demands of the flesh, we are slaves.

Now Paul turns to the nature of temptation, regarding it as an experience of testing. Temptations are common to all men, though some men, more than others, are more susceptible to certain temptations. Through it all, Paul says, God is faithful. He can be trusted. He will never allow us to be tempted beyond our ability to resist without leaving us a way out or giving us sufficient strength to bear the temptation.

God does not cause us to be tempted. He permits us to be tempted, that we be strengthened and made adequate to life's compelling events. Never giving us greater burdens than we can bear, He either gives us the strength to bear them or opens a way of escape by which we can flee temptation and find moral safety. We have only to cast ourselves upon His mercy and look to Him for guidance and support.

Because Christians, through their participation in the Lord's Supper, have a common relationship with Him and with each other, they should do nothing which would compromise this relationship or the principles of a pure, moral life with which Christians must comply.

Though Christians are free from the bondage of sin, they have a tremendous responsibility to conduct themselves in such a manner that others will not be harmed either by their example or influence. If every-

thing we do glorifies God, the ultimate result of our conduct will be a beneficial influence upon the lives of others. Such conduct can not possibly result in other believers stumbling, and many others may be saved.

The first verse of 1 Peter 4 is quite difficult, but contains a very great truth. It should never be forgotten that Christ died not only for sin, but to condemn sin in the flesh. In His death a break was made between the life He had lived in contact with sin, though Himself sinless, and the other life which He spends on the resurrection side of death.

Since God views us as having died in His death and being raised in His resurrection, we must regard ourselves as forever passed out of a life in which flesh and sense reign supreme and living in a life where they have no foothold, dead unto God through Jesus Christ.

The flesh may have its desires but the cleansed heart will refuse to yield to them. Thus, the flesh will be crucified and mortified with its affections and lusts, and the conscience kept void of offense.

**Everyone Calls Headquarters When Election Is Announced**

OTTAWA (CP)—For most political parties, that hurried feeling is back at national headquarters with the announcement of the Nov. 8 election.

Mrs. Bobby O'Neill, a Liberal public relations worker, here described the difference a day makes: "Everything has to be done right at the minute requested."

Visits to some party headquarters here leave the impression that everybody reached for a telephone and called headquarters the day after the announcement.

The telephone was ringing when the first person showed up for work at 7:30 a.m. at Conservative headquarters.

Just before noon, Richard Thrasher, the Conservative national director, had six long-distance calls hanging his executive assistant, Flora MacDonald, had three.

Terry Grier, the New Democratic Party's national secretary, puffed a cigarette as he sat at his desk with his telephone rang all day too.

Bill MacEachern, Liberal public relations director, said many of the phone calls were from volunteer workers offering their

services.

The Creditaires, who work out of the Parliament buildings office of leader Real Caouette, also had an over-active telephone.

The NDP, Liberal and Conservative headquarters in the capital resembled busy business offices.

**Service Marks Anniversary**

August the first marked the completion of the first hundred years since the printing of the first Yoruba New Testament. The churches of Nigeria held special services on that day to mark this event.

It was a slave boy who became one of the first African Bible translators. Sold four times from one trader to another, this young Nigerian lad eventually came under the care of a Christian schoolmaster. Soon he longed to return to his own people to share with them the Good News of Jesus Christ and the new life he had found.

After many adventurous years he did return to Nigeria. His Yoruba, even after twenty-five years, was still fluent. He was possessed with the necessity of providing the Scriptures in the Yoruba language. Among his other duties, for he was now Bishop Samuel Adjal Crowther, he found time to devote to the translation of the New Testament. This was printed by the British and Foreign Bible Society in 1865. Today more than 1 1/2 million copies of the Yoruba Bible have been sold in Nigeria.

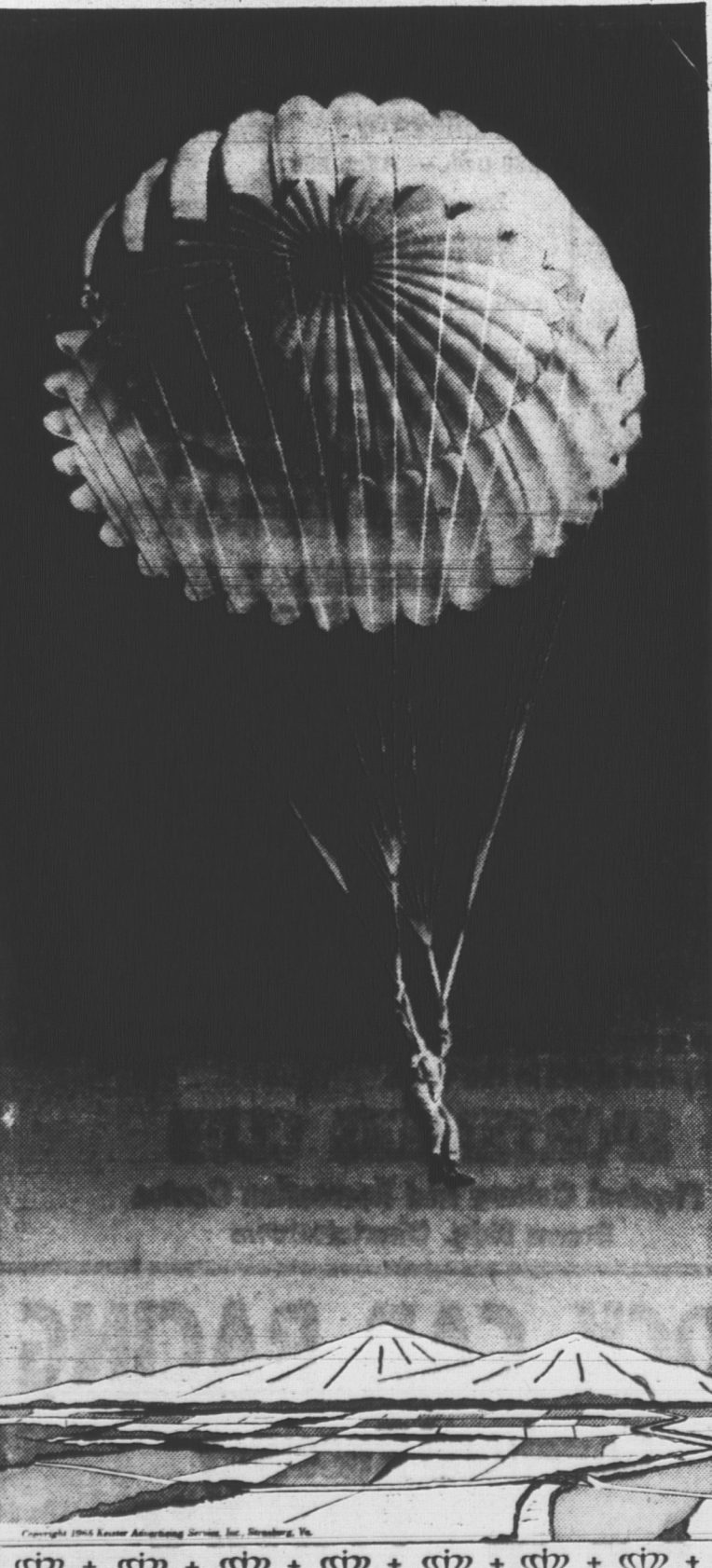
