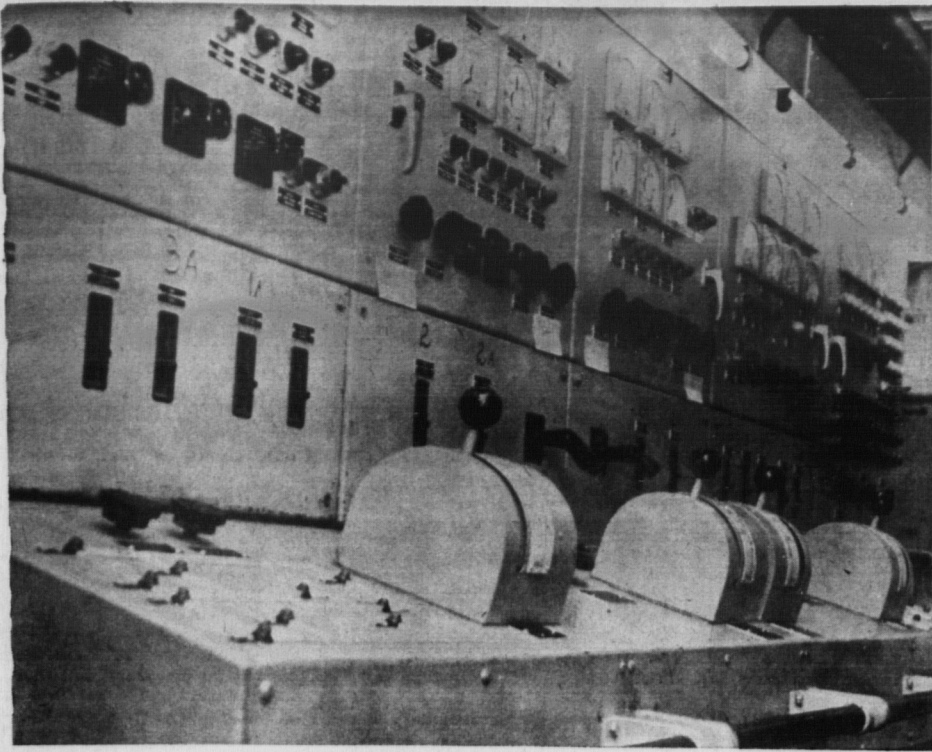


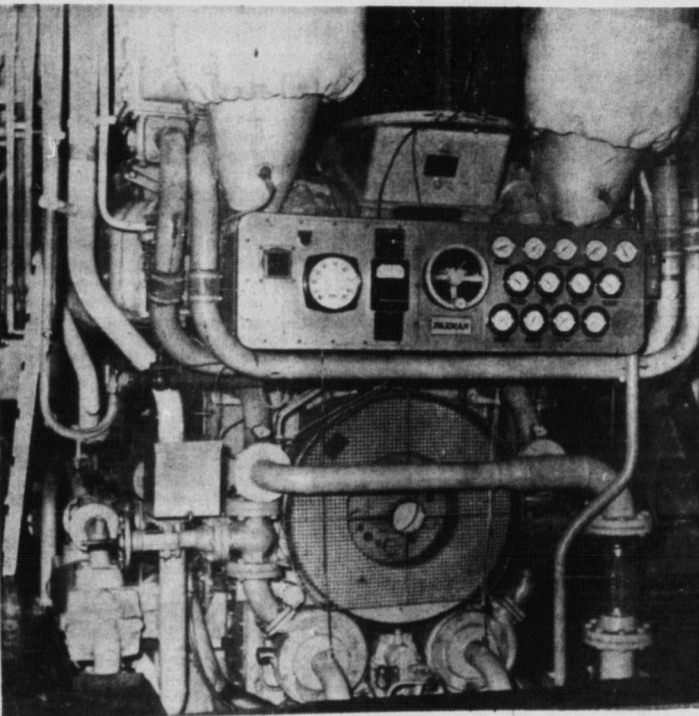
## INTERIOR VIEWS OF NEW FERRY 'CONFEDERATION'

The two boys for the past few days had been under treatment in the Charlottetown Hospital, by Dr. K.G. Ellis, Hunter River, and Dr. J.H. O'Hanley, Charlottetown, when their conditions became such that it was decided that specialist treatment was necessary.

Sunday afternoon, the ailing boys were transported to the Charlottetown airport by ambulances from the Charlottetown Funeral Home, and placed aboard an RCAF Albatross aircraft for the flight to Montreal.

Accompanied by Dr. Ellis, the aircraft left here at 4 p.m. Sunday and was expected to make Montreal in a little over two hours. There the young patients were placed in the Montreal Children's Hospital, from where no further report had been received last night.

## Victoria To Get Causeway, Park

SUMMERSIDE — A causeway at Victoria was indicated by Premier Walter Shaw on Saturday as a project that will be commenced this summer.

Anticipated for several years by local residents, the causeway will link Victoria Village with a two mile sandy, salt water shore front along the Hampton beach, a part of which has been purchased by the provincial government for establishment of a provincial park.

The premier said he hoped to have discussions with Queens Member of Parliament, Heath Macquarrie, a native of Victoria, concerning the proposed project.

Strong support for the Victoria causeway was also voiced on Saturday by Frank Myers,

MLA, a resident of this area, who pointed out the advantages the causeway and park will have for local residents as well as tourist traffic to the area.

Premier Shaw said he had hoped the Victoria causeway could have been dealt with by the last session of the legislature but expressed the hope that the means would still be sought and found to complete the proposed project this year.

The causeway would span the Westmoreland River that flows into Victoria Harbor and would likely follow the route of a former roadway and bridge that was abandoned about the time of the construction of the Trans-Canada highway.
