

Fire Destroys Home & Outbuildings At Iona

All that remains standing is a water pump, after fire completely destroyed all the buildings on the premises of Mr. Michael McGarry, Iona, Sunday afternoon. The house, pump-house, two barns, and all household effects were a total loss.

Mr. McGarry reports that the blaze started in the attic of the

house, apparently from a flue-fire. He first noticed the fire shortly before 2 p.m. when he saw smoke coming from the house roof while standing in the yard. There was no time to save anything.
