James McCardle Dies At Age 95 In Hospital

The death occurred Saturday at the Charlottetown Hospital of James McCardle, Middleton, son of the late Owen McCardle and Margaret Croken, he was born at Middleton, in 1870 and reached the advanced age of 95 on Oct. 25.

As a youth the late Mr. McCardle worked for a short time in Saint John, N.B. but apart from this period he lived all his life in Middleton. In 1906 he married Annie Duffy of Thistle and Shamrock and they had nine children, two of whom died as infants.

A progressive farmer and a pioneer in the seed potato industry Mr. McCardle was a life long leader in his community where he worked tirelessly for anything that would improve conditions for the people of his district. He was a devout member of St. Malachy's Parish, Kinkora, and for many years was president of The Holy Name Society. He took great pride in the fact that he was a trustee of Middleton School for 28 years.

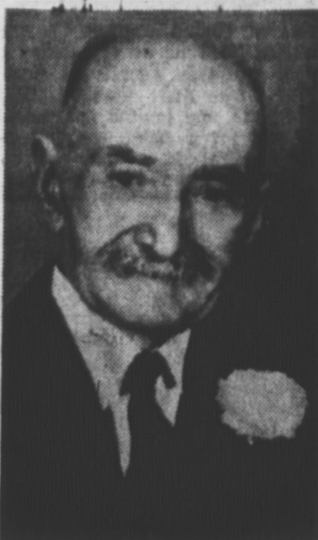
He was always vitally interested in politics, and many a political meeting was enlivened by his ringing defense of Liberal policies.

Long time president of the East Prince Liberal Association, Mr. McCardle could quote Sir Wilfred Laurier, whom he supported in 1906 and was a close friend of MacKenzie King, Louis St. Laurent, the present prime minister, Lester Pearson, and many of the high-ranking Liberal cabinet ministers over the years. The Liberals lost one of their staunchest supporters with the passing of James McCardle.

His wife predeceased him on Nov. 10, 1964.

He is survived by seven children, Very Rev. J.W. McCardle, parish priest, Montague; Charles and Bennett on the home-stand; Elizabeth, Mrs. Earle Hickey, Summerside; Mary, Mrs. John Keete, Philadelphia; Hazel, Mrs. Lester O'Donnell; and Gladys, Mrs. Eugene Cullen, both of Charlottetown.

Mr. McCardle who was the last surviving member of his family will be greatly missed by his children, his twenty-eight grandchildren and a host of friends throughout the province.

Island Team Is Defeated

HALIFAX (Special) — A lightweight team of "East Point Farmers" put up a terrific struggle against the Linden Cubs, a Nova Scotia team, before losing out in a tug-of-war that lasted six minutes and 40 seconds at the Atlantic Winter Fair on Saturday night. The 1,700-pound team is coached by Kenneth MacGregor.

The senior Red Point club that won the Maritime heavyweight title impressively here a year ago, made their first appearance at this year's fair on Friday evening. They will pull again on Saturday night, the final night of the fair, if they are successful on Friday night.

The senior Red Point Farmers club won their matches last year with almost ridiculous ease. They took both their semi-final and final pulls in less than two minutes.

The pull between the Red Point Juniors and the Linden Club was by far the best seen here this year. Both teams received a well merited round of applause when the gruelling match was completed.

Several members of the Linden club collapsed and had to be assisted to their feet several minutes later, so intense was the battle for supremacy.

Grandview Men Win In Tobacco

HALIFAX (Special) — At the Atlantic Winter Fair, Prince Edward Island had to settle for three prizes in tobacco and all of them came to Leonard Vaerewyck and Mark Vanneste, Grandview.

They had a second in leaf, a third in a "stick" of tobacco and a fourth in cutters.

The tobacco was placed by Dr. Donald C. MacKay, Experimental Farm, Charlottetown. It is judged for such things as size of leaf, color, body and odor—the latter is judged by smelling it.

Points are given for appearance of the exhibit, the way it is prepared, the moisture content, freedom from green or dark spots—uniformity—and the general uniformity of color, it is explained by Doug Kilpatrick, provincial tobacco fieldman.

Merchits are listed for such things as signs of blight, leaf spots, and for deadness.

Hallowe'en Damage Is Heavy As Fires Set And Windows Hit

MONTAGUE — Montague Police report more damage than usual from the Hallowe'en celebration on Saturday night.

Some 20 windows were broken in the Montague Regional High School, two in the Elementary School, Boehner's Jewellery, also glass in several private homes, with one stone crashing through a window and into a television set, breaking the picture tube at the home of Roy Clow.

Three fires were set, one on the Wood Island Hill, two on School Street, all were of straw. The Town Police and Montague Fire Brigade maintained an all night vigil and reported the two-way radio setup possibly prevented considerably more property damage. It is also reported that schools and halls in the surrounding area had broken glass.

Ed Downs, town police, said that three vandals will be charged in connection with the school damage and others are on the suspected list.

Merrill Wight, Montague, was rushed to the Kings County Hospital when his car left the highway in an endeavour to avoid hitting trick-or-treat children.

Noticably absent was the use of soap. The younger children usually do a pretty good job of plastering windows of business firms but for some reason no windows were soaped.

MORE FIRES
Last night the celebration continued with three calls being answered by the Montague Fire Brigade. The first was to a straw fire near the feed service of Fraser and Anner. The second was a false call to MacDonald Avenue and the third was to John Beer Drive where two car tires had been set on fire.

Fire Chief Coffin advised his men would have to remain on duty through the night in case other fires would be set.

The Town Police remained on duty all night Saturday and Sunday and faced the same obstacles

Premier Objects To Power Claim

Premier Walter R. Shaw last night challenged a statement attributed to Transport Minister Pickersgill that the provincial government is not convinced that the federal government can supply cheap electrical power to the province.

Speaking at an election campaign rally in Montague Friday night, Mr. Pickersgill was quoted as saying "we have been trying to get the provincial government to take cheap electrical power but we haven't been able to sell the idea...they are still not convinced."

Premier Shaw said "this is a false statement."

"The Atlantic Development Board, after engineering research as to its feasibility, proposed the laying of a cable from the mainland to this province with the power grid of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. This proposal was accepted by the government of this province and the officials of the Atlantic Development Board were informed of our acceptance."

"This matter was again considered when the decision to construct the Northumberland Strait causeway-bridge-tunnel was announced. Again the government of this province accepted ADB's proposal to have the connecting cable on the strait crossing instead of by submarine cable."

STUDY GIVEN
"A great deal of study was given to this matter. Our concern was to secure adequate supply of electric power for the anticipated requirements for our industrial developments at the cheapest cost."

"A meeting of ADB officials, Nova Scotia and New Brunswick power commissions representatives, public utilities board members and our cabinet discussed the various aspects of the problem with particular emphasis on the cost of energy and the certainty that an adequate supply would be available. No definite assurance on either of these points could be arrived at."

"With the anticipated development of larger sources of power in both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, however, we decided that we should take advantage of joining the Nova Scotia-New Brunswick grid and as I mentioned we told the Atlantic Development Board of our decision."

"The minister of transport has added another verse to the long chapter of erroneous statements which has so characterized the efforts of his leader and colleagues during this election campaign."
