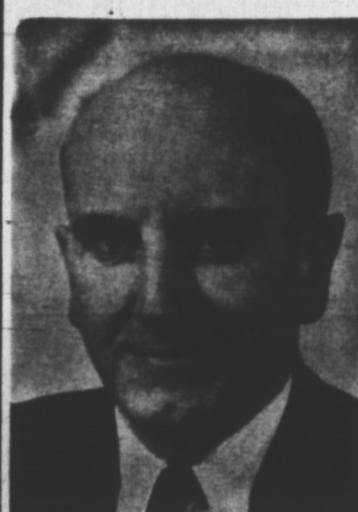
higher for the two days than for the show last year.

Egg Support Maximum Set

OTTAWA (CP) — The federal government's egg price support program, switching Sept. 30 from a purchase system to one of deficiency payments, will limit payments to a maximum quota of 4,000 dozen eggs for each farmer.

The agriculture department, announcing details of the plan Wednesday, said the support will be provided to producers marketing eggs through registered egg trading stations.

After Sept. 30 the government no longer will purchase eggs to support their price—the current support level is 44 cents a dozen for grade A large eggs at Montreal and Toronto.

Instead it will allow the price to find its own level on the market, with the government making up the difference if the average price to producers across the country falls below the prescribed support level.

Concessions Cut Prices

TORONTO (CP) — Two food concessions at the Canadian National Exhibition have drastically cut prices but other concessions are having none of it.

The booths, both crowned by Max Noble and William Mulholland, are offering hamburgers for 19 cents, soft drinks for a nickel, and a plate of chips for a dime.

All other stands are selling hamburgers for a quarter to 30 cents, pop for a dime and chips for 20 cents.

Mulholland said "everybody was screaming about how high food prices were here last year. We want to show we can lower our prices and still make money."
