

Naval Frigates Due Here Monday

Two frigates of the Royal Canadian Navy are scheduled to arrive in port Monday, August 10th, it has been announced by naval officials here.

The ships are H.M.C.S. Swansea, under the command of Lieutenant Commander W.D.R. Johnston, R.C.N., and H.M.C.S. La Hulouise under the command of Lieutenant Commander H.A. Porter, R.C.N.

Carrying a complement of approximately 12 officers, 45 Cadets and 120 men each they will dock at the Railway Wharf about 4 p.m.

The visiting ships, which are on a Cadet Training cruise, will remain in port until Wednesday morning.

Pay Tribute To Memory of Taft

MURRAY BAY, Que., (CP)—Summer residents and long-time citizens of this resort paid tribute at a memorial service Tuesday to the late Senator Robert A. Taft. At least four generations of Tafts have spent summer vacations at this lower St. Lawrence river resort. Tuesday's service was timed to coincide with the private funeral at Cincinnati where the American statesman was buried.

French-speaking residents of this district joined in the service, conducted by Rev. K. Keefe. Some of the younger members of the Taft family remained here for the service while their parents went to the state funeral in Washington.

Senator Taft was a member of Murray Bay Protestant Church and regularly attended Sunday services with members of his family when here. His father, William Howard Taft, one-time president of the United States, was one of the earlier summer residents who helped establish the popularity of Murray Bay as a resort centre.

Supreme Soviet

permit a full meeting of the Communist party central committee.

There is expectation among Western observers that the Supreme Soviet session will throw new light upon the struggle for power in the Kremlin, perhaps giving a hint whether the Soviet military has thrown its full weight into the balance or actually has taken control.

The July issue of the magazine Communist, the official theoretical and political journal of the central committee, reached the United States Tuesday. Its leading editorial contains this line with regard to the Beria purge:

"Enemies of the Soviet Union in connection with the death of J. V. Stalin gambled upon the weakening of the Soviet state."

This was the first time, so far as can be determined outside the Iron Curtain, that Stalin's death has been mentioned in connection with Beria's alleged plot to place his secret police network above the party and government. It dates that alleged Beria machinations to coincide with the time of Stalin's death, when the country was warned against panic and the party was ordered to remain firmly united.

Beria must have been in a strong position at the time to come up with the second place spot in the ruling hierarchy. It took a great concentration of strength to bring about his downfall, and there seems to have been no other source for that strength except the Soviet Army marshals and generals.

Announcements from the Supreme Soviet, dictated to it by the ruling clique, may contain the key, possibly on how the leaders are ranked now.

The Supreme Soviet is the highest legislative organ of the USSR, but it has no real power. It simply approves actions which have already been accomplished.

There is a good chance that some striking announcements will be made regarding the Soviet economy and the national budget. Such announcements might indicate the extent to which the ruling power is bowing—for the first time—to Soviet public opinion.
