Banks Survey In Full Swing

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP) - A two pronged attack is being launched by the geological secrets of the Grand Banks is expected to yield some concrete answers to a question posed... by the Pan American Petroleum Corporation... a sandy shale over oil-bearing rock?

The first survey - an aerial magnetometer study is being conducted by Hunting Surveys of Toronto. It began earlier in the month after Pan American obtained permits for underwater exploration on the banks.

The second phase will be carried out by the company's "sea explorers" that send shock and sound waves to the ocean's bottom. The interval between the sending of the waves and their return is measured by electronic instruments tell geologists what they can expect when they begin drilling for oil.

Both ships will take on additional equipment here before heading for the banks later this week. They will stay on the banks until October, weather permitting.

Khrushchev Promises Farmers, Civil Servants Better Deal

By HENRY S. BRADSHAW MOSCOW (AP) - The people at the bottom of the Soviet economic ladder, collective farmers and public service employees, were promised a better deal Monday by Premier Khrushchev.

Ranking Soviet living standards is the most important ideological consideration now, Khrushchev declared at the opening summer session of the Supreme Soviet, the national parliament.

The premier announced a decision to provide pensions for the first time to about 6,500,000 collective farmers and called it a measure of "great historic importance."

Effective Jan. 1, farm men reaching 65 and farm women reaching 60 will become eligible for monthly pensions ranging from 12 rubles to 102 rubles.

HALIFAX (CP) - A 185,000-pound whale meat shipment left Halifax Monday as Nova Scotia's experimental whaling project kept crews working seven days a week.

This body, the one found Sunday, was believed to be the lower half of the victim. Meanwhile, officials at Jacksonville, Fla., tentatively identified the remains of the first body as that of Charles Moore, 26, Meridian Beach, Fla., a welder and former Alcorn A. M. college student.

Dr. J. D. Boyd, president of Alcorn A. M., said Moore's family reported he left home Sunday, June 28, 1964. Officials ordered a search of the Old River on the possibility the body found Sunday might be one of the three civil rights workers who vanished near Memphis, Miss., June 21.
