BOARD OF HEALTH.—A meeting of the Board of Health is being held this afternoon, beginning at 3 o'clock.

OBITUARY.—We regret to hear of the death at Boston on the 15th of February last, of McDonald Atkins, in his fortieth year, a native of Belle Creek, P. E. Island. He was well known on the Island. While a young man he learned the carriage building trade at Mr. Scantlebury's establishment in Charlottetown. He married a Miss Nicholson, of Strathallan, and about five years after emigrated to the States.

WESTMINSTER ABBEY.—If only one object in London could be selected for inspection by tourists, it would doubtless be Westminster Abbey. The original church was erected about the year 610, but this and two successors were pulled down, and rebuilt, till finally in the present form, was constructed in the reign of Henry the Third. A very fine photograph of this building appears in Part II of Stoddard's Portfolio.

SERMONS AND APPEAL COURTS.—The Court of Appeal in Equity will meet tomorrow at 11 o'clock, a. m., for the purpose of giving judgment in the case of Wm. E. Dawson and others vs. the Trustees of the Wesleyan Methodist School. Immediately after the Supreme Court will open, when the case of Clara Elvewhinnill vs. George W. Moore will be called and heard. This case was adjourned from the January sitting, owing to the illness of one of the witnesses.

SENIOR AFTERNOON SERVICE.—Heartz' Hall was packed yesterday afternoon. Charles Palmer, Esq., delivered an excellent discourse, which was highly appreciated by the audience. Highly appreciated, too, was the music, both vocal and instrumental. Mr. B. Heartz has furnished the hall with a fine-toned organ, thus adding materially to the attractiveness of the hall which he has placed at the disposal of the public for religious purposes.

CUSTOMS AND ISLAND REVENUE.—There is a decrease of \$27,272.60 in the duties received by the Customs of the port of Montreal last month over the corresponding month of last year. The amount of duties received last month was \$509,985.84, whilst in February, 1893, there was collected \$537,258.44. The amount of inland revenue received in the month of February, 1894, was \$162,529.98, whilst last month there was collected \$169,942.88, being an increase of \$4,412.89.

THAT CARELESS DRUG CLERK.—A lady in Halifax is suffering in consequence of a mistake made in a Halifax drug store. She was given a prescription by a northern doctor for a lotion with which to rub her face. It seems that when the prescription was left at the store the head clerk was busy and he handed it to a lad, an employe, to make up. The latter put nitric acid in the bottle instead of some harmless liquid. The lady applied the lotion, with the result that her face and head were terribly burned.—Halifax Mail.

SPRING TAILS.—The snow, across North River, yesterday, was observed at one point, to be covered by myriads of lively insects, which to the naked eye looked like diminutive fleas. The apparent spontaneous generation of life in the midst of snow and ice gave rise to some comment, and specimens were brought to town despite the suggestion that they might be "microbes of something." Under the microscope one was found to resemble a cross between a caterpillar and a lobster. Mr. Bain informs us that the insects are known as "spring-tails" from the fact that they have under their tails, springs, by which they are enabled to hop about.

ASSAULT CASE.—William Cooper, of Royalty Junction, appeared on Saturday afternoon before H. V. Palmer, Esq., J. P., on complaint of Mrs. Emma Diamond of the same place. The charge was assault inflicted by the accused, who also is the son-in-law of the complainant, Mrs. Diamond. From the woman's evidence it appears that her boys were given leave to take some wreckage on the railway track, and while so engaged the defendant, Cooper, appeared and also took a hand in the removal, saying he had received permission from the Station Master. He removed one load and went for the second. A row ensued between the boys and Cooper, when the mother interfered, and the defendant said, he shoved her away and she landed in a snowbank. Mrs. Diamond alleges that he choked her, but the defendant says he used no violence. Cooper was fined \$1 and costs. Mr. H. J. Palmer appeared for the prisoner.

A STRAY.—A Japanese whale was washed ashore near Carson's Inlet, N. Y., last week. The fish is very rare outside of its native waters, the Japan Sea.

A LING SEVENTE.—A Vermont liquor dealer was recently sentenced to 75 years imprisonment for violating the prohibition law of that State. The defendant appealed to the county court when he pleaded guilty of 207 offences, reducing the penalty to about 60 years.

FOCALISTICAL SEMINARY.—The Roman Catholic Episcopal corporation has decided to erect a building at once in Halifax, for the purpose of a theological school, which will eventually develop into an ecclesiastical seminary for the Maritime provinces.

POLICE COURT.—There was a large attendance at the Police Court this forenoon. The first case called was that of P. S. Brown, for breach of the Liquor Regulation Act between the 1st of January and the 28th of February. There were five witnesses examined in this case. One of the witnesses stated that he was handed liquor through the door of the dwelling by a woman whom he did not quite know. This was the only important evidence brought out. The case was adjourned till Thursday, March 8th.

Arthur Gates vs. Josiah Carmoly.—This was an assault case, over the payment of a bill owed by Carmoly to Stewart & Gates. An assault was proven, and Carmoly was fined \$1 and costs for 4 days.

The well known character, John Ring, appeared on a charge of drunk and incapable. He asked his Honor for two months. He was fined \$20 or 60 days with hard labor.

A young man from the country was fined \$2 or ten days.

George E. Goff, Esq., of Woodville, and his bride returned to Charlottetown on Saturday.

Sergeant Bradley resumed duty to-day after an absence of about a week with a severe attack of the grippe.

Mr. Fred W. Xie, city editor of the Patriot, is, we regret to hear, suffering from a relapse of la grippe.

Mr. Pottinger, General Manager of Government Railways, crossed at the Capes to-day in the evening, here by mail special this afternoon.

Matters in England having become entangled during his absence, Editor Sterd is about to return home. But he promises to return to the States next year.

The death of H. F. McNair, Esq., of Malpeque, is announced. The deceased was in his 72d year, one of the oldest Masons in the Province, and highly respected.

The Earl of Kintore, Governor of Western Australia, proceeds this month from England to the Antipodes by the Canadian-Australian route. He will spend a fortnight in Canada, and will sail from Vancouver for Sydney on April 6th in the Arawa, in company with his aides-de-camp.

The Pioneer politely invites Judge McLeod to take up his residence in Summerside. Should Judge McLeod accept the offer, Summerside will have gained a good citizen. But it would not be wonderful if he should find it too hard to tear himself away from Charlottetown.

Mr. Thomas Leturgey, the business manager of this office, left early last Monday morning for a trip to British Columbia on private business. He goes there to look after the estate of the late Archibald McMurdo, Mrs. Leturgey being a sister of the deceased. The estate is valued at a good many thousands, which will be divided among the remaining members of the family. Mr. McMurdo having died unmarried.—Pioneer.
