

MEETING AT BROOKLYN.

A political meeting was held at Brooklyn on 22nd January, 1891. The number present was not as large as expected on account of the unfavorable weather.

Hon. Mr. Clow, M. E. C., was the first to occupy the floor, being called upon by the chairman. In a short address, he opened up the mysteries which appeared to hang over the public schools in regard to the holidays, the exchange of books and the conditions upon which these changes were to be made.

These subjects were again brought up by Mr. McLeod, M. P. P., and treated as in the previous address.

Dr. Robertson then stepped forward. He was not prepared to say much for or against the books. As for other matters, he like all other clippers from the same timber, tried to make us believe that no right act had been performed since the overthrow of the Davies Government. The roads and bridges, he said, were far better ten or fifteen years ago. He said that the actions of the Government proved almost fatal to one of our leading factories. A bridge over the Toronto Road was made famous by a cavity at one side, and the carts laden with potatoes for the factory coming into this struck violently against the side of the bridge and thus deposited a portion of their cargo in the cave. To such an extent did this take place that in a little hole between the marks of the two wheels were deposited potatoes to the amount of three dozen carts, making in all over 700 bushels, of which the said factory was deprived. This is the liberal description of the way in which potatoes are stored up in that country.

After a few more whizzes from other clippers of the aforesaid timber regarding the roads, bridges, deficiency in crops, etc., the following resolutions were made:

That the government import thirty or forty thousand bushels of black oats and sell the same to the farmers at cost and charges.

That the representatives should exert their influence in trying to obtain a grant of \$200 to be expended upon the Wood Island Road from Caledonia to Montague Bridge.

PUBLIC NOTICE.

IN FUTURE the Government Steamer "Stanley" will run during the winter months between Charlottetown and Pictou with the ice will admit of her making a return trip each day, commencing on the 1st December.

If, however, the Company's boats cannot keep up daily communication between the Island and mainland before the 1st December, the steamer "Stanley" will commence running earlier than the 1st December, so as to keep up daily communication.

When the steamer "Stanley" cannot make return trips between Charlottetown and Pictou, she will then run between Pictou and Georgetown and make daily trips, if possible.

When the ice becomes so heavy that she cannot make return daily trips, the ice boats will carry the mails between Cape Traverse and Cape Tormentine, so as to give a daily mail to the Island throughout the winter, weather permitting, and the "Stanley" will then run between Pictou and Georgetown for the purpose of carrying passengers and freight, making only one trip each day, leaving Pictou on Monday, Wednesday and Friday mornings, at 7 o'clock, and leaving Georgetown on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday mornings at the same hour.

Notice of her arrival at Georgetown will be made public by the Agent of the Marine Department at Charlottetown each day, and also the hour of her intended departure from Georgetown.

As soon as the "Stanley" begins making a return trip between the mainland and the Island in the early part of the year, the Iceboat Service at the Capes will be discontinued, so that as far as possible a daily mail each way will be conveyed between the mainland and the Island during the winter.

The "Stanley" will remain on the route until the 1st May in each year, and will continue longer than that date if the Company's boats are not able to keep up daily communication with the Island.
