



# Red Wings Score 6-1 Victory Over Black Hawks

DETROIT (CP)—Gordie Howe scored three times in the last period Thursday night as Detroit Red Wings rolled to a 6-1 victory over Chicago Black Hawks that assured them of no worse than a second-place finish in the National Hockey League race.

Detroit's sharpshooting right-winger, who hasn't finished under the 30-goal mark since 1949, ran his total to 27 on barely 10 minutes of last-period play. It was his first three-goal night this season.

Alexander Red Kelly and center Alex Delvecchio mounted in the opening frame with Delvecchio scoring again in the second period.

Jerry Toppazzini got the lone hawk tally late in the first period. Chicago right-winger Jack McHale was carried from the ice on a stretcher after colliding with a goalpost in the third period.

While the victory put the Wings

beyond the reach of the third-place Toronto Maple Leafs, they retained four points behind the leading Montreal Canadiens, who defeated Boston 4-1 Thursday night.

# Beliveau Paces Canadiens To 4-1 Win Over Bruins

BOSTON (AP)—Jean Beliveau regained the National Hockey League scoring lead from teammate Maurice Richard Thursday night as he fired two goals to pace Montreal Canadiens to a 4-1 victory over Boston Bruins.

Beliveau now has 70 points on 25 goals and 45 assists—one ahead of Richard's 69. Bernie (Boom Boom) Geoffrion, who assisted on Beliveau's pair, has 68 points to complete the high-scoring trio.

The Canadiens, who now have gone seven games without defeat, showed particularly deft stick work in gaining their first two goals.

The first came at 1:51 of the first period with Boston defenseman Felix Flaman off the ice. Doug Harvey cut loose a 45-foot shot from the left side and Beliveau—stationed in front of the nets—caught the puck in flight with the end of his stick and steered it past goalie John Henderson.

At 3:31 of the second period Bert Olmstead's originating pass got by four Bruins to Geoffrion at the Boston blue line and he fed

Beliveau in front of the goal for the score. Ken Mosdell tipped in a backhander just before the goal ended.

A crowd of 11,634 saw Boston night at the scoring column at 2:02 of the final as Real Chevreffs connected.

Just 45 seconds before the final buzzer, Montreal's Calum Mackay scored the fourth goal on a pass from Mosdell.

# Penticton Scores 3 Times In Four Minutes To Shut Out Sweden; Russia Keeps Pace

(By Arch MacKenzie, Canadian Press Staff Writer)  
 KREFELD, Germany (CP)—Kept off the scoresheet for more than half the game, Canada Penticton Vs-scored three times in four minutes Thursday night to defeat Sweden 3-0 and record their sixth straight victory in the world hockey championships.

Playing in Krefeld's Rhineland-Halle before a capacity crowd of 7,000, the good young Swedish team put up stiff resistance, holding Penticton scoreless until Hal Tarayla connected at 11:33 of the second period. Jack McIntyre and Grant Warwick quickly added insurance goals and the Canadians coasted through the third period.

Russia, playing without their star, team captain Vsevolod Bobrov, who took the day off to watch the Canadians, humble Germany 5-1 in Duesseldorf. It was also the sixth straight win for the Russians and left no doubt that Sunday night's big clash between the Soviet and Canada will decide the title. Russia is the defending champion.

The United States and Czechoslovakia battled to a stormy 4-4 tie in which the tying American goal was disputed. The deadlock left the Americans and the Czechs in third place. Poland defeated Finland 6-3 in an afternoon game at Cologne for its second victory. The Finns have lost all six of their matches.

# BEST CLUB YET

The Canada-Sweden game was a clean, pleasing one to watch. "This is the best game we've met yet," said Grant Warwick, the playing coach. "We scored our three in four minutes and that was enough. We dogged it a bit in the third period."

Defenceman Jack Taggart and forward Jim Middleton, who arrived by air from Canada at 3 p.m., played their first game for Penticton Thursday night and both showed well. Taggart added strength to the defence with some sharp poke-checking. But both men were slumped down in the dressing room, exhausted.

It was the third shutout for goalie Ivan McLennan, who has allowed only one goal in Canada's last four games and only five in the six games since the 10-day tournament started last Friday night. McLennan, 24-year-old native of Timmins, Ont., leads all the goalkeepers with a remarkable average of .83.

# SOFT TOUCH

Only Nikolai Putschkov, the Soviet goalie, is anywhere close to the Canadian with an average of one goal a game.

Penticton plays Germany tonight, a soft touch, and then has a one-day rest before the clincher against Russia. The Soviets meet Switzerland today also, and then they are free Saturday.

The Canada-Russia game at Krefeld is scheduled for 4 p.m. GMT 11 a.m. EST.

The close, checking Swedes skated hard and fast and the Swiss referees cracked down early. Over the route Canada got three of the four.

The wildest scrambles for glory and gold among the individual stars concern the scoring leadership and the best-goalie performance.

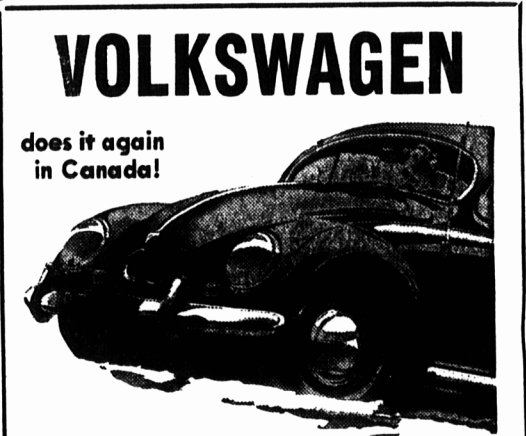
