D. MDCCCXXXIX in Jesu obdormivit ad Edwardo Jarvis Hodgson, Iugis Provincie Magistre Romanorum datum est."

GENERAL TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

ROME, June 12.—It is stated that the pope intends to issue an encyclical on the Anglican prelates, urging them to recognize his authority and jurisdiction. In vaticanic circles it is admitted that such an encyclical is comprised in the pope's programme, but it is withheld until the ground is better prepared for its favorable reception. The object of the pope, who is also preparing an encyclical on the dissenting eastern churches is to restore complete unity in the church.

CHICAGO, June 12.—Theodore Nevins, one of the doorkeepers of the board of trade, was taken off in the smallpox ambulance today. He must have spoken to and been in contact with dozens of members before his condition was discovered. The gallery contained about fifty visitors, who, if thoroughly alarmed, it is said that Nevins had been ill with the disease three weeks, and all the time on duty.

BOSTON, June 12.—In the house of representatives today the bill prohibiting the manufacture and sale of cigarettes was passed to be engrossed, after rejecting all sufficiently amendments. The bill allowing the Norwegian system of liquor selling to be established was passed to be engrossed, 81 to 67.

LONDON, June 12.—The agents in this city of the various British colonies and Sir Charles Tupper, the Canadian commissioner, have signed and presented to the Marquis of Ripon, the secretary of state for the colonies, today a petition in reference to the extension of the proposed new death duties to colonial property. The petitioners urge that such property should be exempted when it is proved that the colonial duty has already been paid.

MONTREAL, June 12.—The cable to the Star says: London, June 12.—The Earl of Jersey, imperial delegate to the intercolonial conference left today with the colonial office officials for Ottawa. It is not likely that the imperial government will accede to the request for the appointment of another imperial delegate. The Earl of Jersey, it is thought, through his extensive knowledge of colonial affairs, will be enabled to give full expression of the present views of the British government, whose action will be largely dependent upon the session of the conference.

SOFIA, June 12.—Premier Stanbuloff paid a farewell visit to Prince Ferdinand yesterday. He was hoisted as he drove to and from the palace. The police prevented the people from taking more violent measures.

LONDON, June 12.—Lord Roseberry has scratched his horse Ladas, winner of the two thousand guinea Newmarket stakes and the Derby, from Prince of Wales stakes at Ascot, the only race in which Ladas is entered at that meeting.

St. HILAIRE, Que., June 12.—Rev. J. E. Blanchard of St. Hilaire has bequeathed the seminary of St. Hyacinthe \$10,000, besides several thousand dollars to his bishop and to nuns of St. Pelage and St. Hilaire. Only a few hundred dollars were left to relatives, and the latter will contest the will.
