

# Hawks Shade Red Wings But Win Proves Costly

DETROIT (CP) — Chicago Black Hawks lost two players en route but managed to score a 2-1 victory over Detroit Red Wings in the third game of their best-of-seven Stanley Cup semi-final series here Tuesday night.

The victory enabled the Hawks to take a 2-1 edge in the series with the fourth game slated for here Thursday night. Hawks would appear to have an edge now as they get the extra home game should the series go the limit.

Chicago Maki who was lost to the club with a knee injury late in the second period, and Eric Nesterenko scored for the Hawks. Both came in the middle period.

Right winger Bryan Watson, who did another superb job in checking Chicago super star Bobby Hull, accounted for Detroit's lone goal.

Stan Mikita, collided with defenceman Leo Boivin late in the second period and was removed from the ice on a stretcher.

Reports were that Maki suffered a sprain to the right knee and possible torn ligaments. He was listed as a doubtful starter for Thursday's contest.

For the second consecutive game, Watson was superb in his coverage of Hull. He shadowed the 27-year-old Hawk left-winger at every turn and allowed him few scoring opportunities.

The Wings were a far cry from the club that walloped the Hawks 7-0 in Chicago Sunday. They seemed to lack the drive

and zip they exhibited in the second game and Chicago came on as the stronger team.

**WINGS FADE**  
The Wings took a 1-0 lead in the first period and appeared as if they would make it two straight over Chicago. However, when the Hawks scored their two goals, the Wings faded and allowed the Chicago team to control the game.

Watson was picked as the favorite of the crowd of 14,495 and he drew several rousing cheers whenever he threw a hard check at Hull. Hull appeared to do the heavier damage in the close checking with Watson, but Watson kept the Chicago ace from scoring.

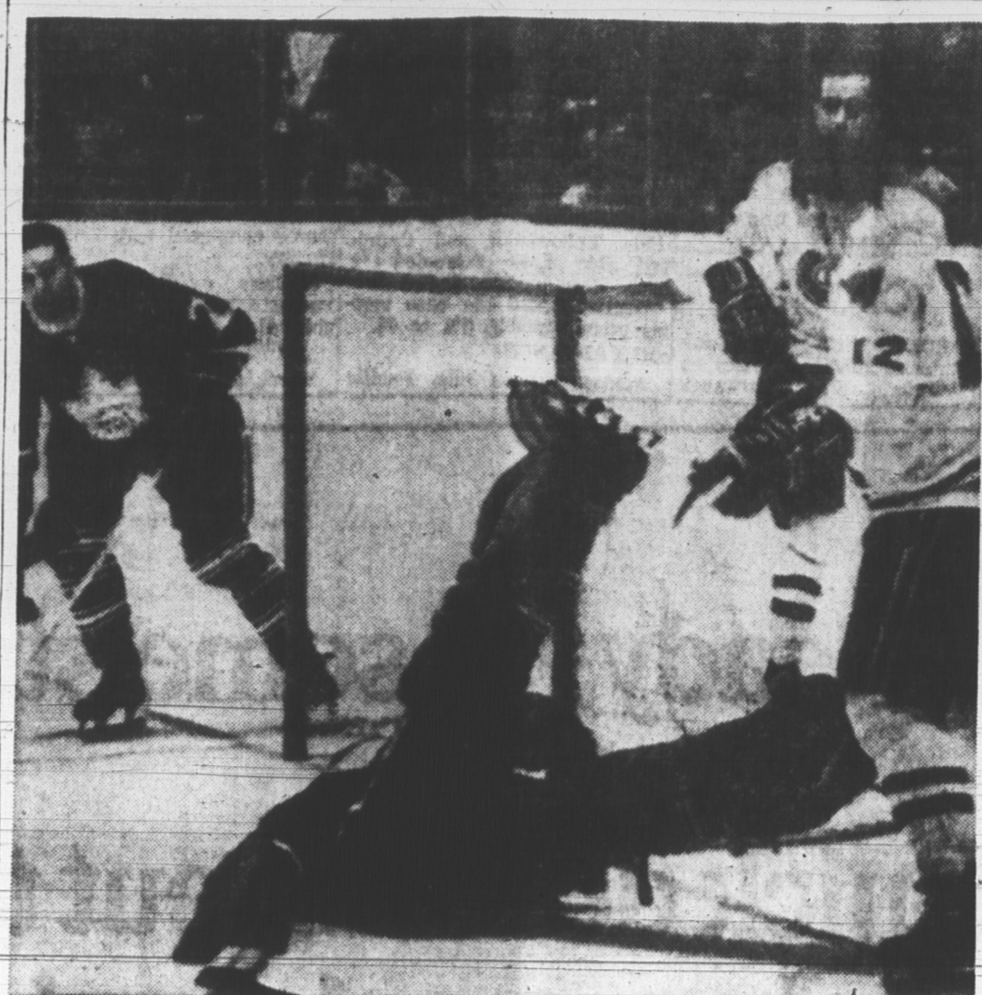
After being wrestled to the ice by Hull at the three-quarter mark of the first period, Watson snared a pass by defenceman Bill Gadsby and raced up right wing. He drilled a long shot from just over the blue line which bounced in front of goalie Glenn Hall and into the net.

## Play For Pay Gets Underway

National and American League baseball teams swung into the play for pay grind yesterday and as players look ahead all they can see is the long hot summer. Pre-season oddsmakers (those are the bookies of course) have made the Dodgers and Minnesota Twins, the defending champs favorites again but the scribes of the baseball world don't see the pennant race ending that way. A panel of approximately 20 of the top sports scribes in the country picked the Cincinnati Reds to lead the National League at the wire and felt that the Baltimore Orioles would come out on top of the junior (most fans know it as American) loop.

Pre season form often means nothing in the world of sport but it is always the starting point for a good deal of speculation. All of the 20 major league clubs have played between 25 and 30 games in the Grapefruit circuit and the final standings in the exhibition play offer some interesting surprises for the more gullible of ball fans.

For example the New York Mets finished the exhibition loop with a percentage of .583 on the basis of 14 wins and 10 losses. That put them in second place among National League clubs and they were the fourth team (in standings) among the 20 odd clubs. On the other hand Minnesota, who ran away with the American league last year, were mired in the second division of the ABL and did not show too much strength in the pre season play. The Dodgers were second last in the National standings (having won 10 and lost 16) but the only club that was under them in 10th place was the Cincinnati Reds who won 10 to 30 contests. This sequence is rather interesting to say the least, for the two clubs that ended on the bottom in exhibition play are favored to lead the loop come September.

I quite agree with the fact that the Dodgers will end up on top of the loop and it is rather easy to see how they had such a bad pre season record. After all they were missing Dandy Sandy and Don Drysdale. The Reds on the other hand are hoping that they can bolster their pitching staff and even traded off one of the top hitters in the NBL to add to their hurlers. Frank Robinson, who holds a .303 lifetime average will not be missed too much by the Reds however as he had a poor season in last year and the Reds still led the league by a sizeable margin in the batting statistics.

All in all there is going to be a real battle in the National League and on paper the American League is going to present a race this year too for the first time in some years. Minnesota, Baltimore, Cleveland, Chicago and New York all pose threats to take the crown and it is going to be quite a while before a pattern is set. Unlike then this corner is not going to make any predictions.

# Habs Humiliate Toronto; Grab Commanding Lead

TORONTO (CP) — Montreal Canadiens erupted for three goals in three minutes and 10 seconds midway through the second period and rolled to a 5-2 victory over Toronto Maple Leafs Tuesday night to take a commanding 3-0 margin in their Stanley Cup semi-final series.

Centre Ralph Backstrom started the Montreal comeback in the middle period. From then on the Canadiens never looked back and had the Leafs floundering and befuddled.

The clubs meet again here Thursday night in the fourth game and Toronto must win to keep the best-of-seven series alive and force a fifth contest in Montreal next Saturday.

Canadiens, defending Stanley Cup champions, also got goals from Bobby Rousseau, Terry Harper, John Ferguson and Jean Beliveau, who scored into an open net.

Toronto, which held a 2-0 margin until Montreal launched its comeback, got goals from Eddie Shack and Tim Horton, both in the first period.

Canadiens erased the 2-0 deficit with their three-goal outburst in the second and then salted away the contest with two more unanswered tallies in the third.

**PASSES CLICK**  
After that goal Montreal appeared to find its skating legs and its passes began to click. It was just a question of time. When Ferguson scored 16 seconds into the final period much of the fire seemed to leave Toronto. The Leafs just couldn't shake the dogged Montreal checkers, particularly Duff and Jim Roberts, Canadiens' ace penalty-killer.

To stay alive Toronto now must win the next four games, a feat accomplished only once in Stanley Cup history, by the 1942 edition of the Leafs.

Despite Toronto's avowed intentions of running Montreal out of the rink with lusty body-checking, Canadiens have yet to appear intimidated.

In fact it was Toronto's pre-occupation with hitting, especially Montreal hardrock Ferguson, that helped Montreal ignite its comeback.

After Backstrom got Montreal's first goal, Shack was caught high-sticking Ferguson and while he was off Rousseau tied the score with his third goal of the series.
