At the annual meeting of the Montreal Corn Exchange, the president, in the course of his address, stated that the Board had strong reasons for believing that a Reciprocity Treaty with the United States would be arranged at the approaching session of the Dominion Parliament.

The Royal Mail Steamer Medway arrived at Plymouth, Eng., from Jamaica on the 11th ult., having on board the Sixth Battery of Royal Artillery, of which the son of the respected Clerk of our City Court is the Sergeant. The Medway occupied nineteen days on the passage, calling at Hayti and Barbadoes on her way. The regular troopship declined to take the Artillerymen because of yellow fever being rampant at Port Royal, attacking the special sanitary stations on the mountains of the island, and causing numerous deaths among the soldiers and their families at the camps of isolation. The military men were obliged, owing to several of the crew being sick of yellow fever, to keep on deck almost continually during the passage, in order to lessen the chances of infection, but by the mercy of Providence and the liberal use of disinfectants and fumigation none of them died on board.

THE CALLASHIN MURDER.

GILLIS SENTENCED

He Protests His Innocence.

He is to be Hanged on the 11th March Next.

MANY SPECTATORS IN TEARS

The Prisoner Calm but Pale.

A Crush in the Court Room.

WEDNESDAY, Feb. 3.

The case of Pearson vs. Sherron has again occupied the attention of the Court. Mr. Hodgson, Q. C., closed for the defence last evening, Mr. Davies, Q. C. for the plaintiff, this forenoon. The Judge delivered his charge this afternoon.

The Court Room was crowded with spectators throughout the day, and there were ladies in the gallery—awaiting the death sentence of the unfortunate Gillis.

At about four o'clock, His Lordship the Chief Justice delivered the sentence. When asked what he had to say why sentence should not be passed against him, the prisoner replied:—

"I have a good deal to say, but I don't suppose it would do me any good now. I know I am innocent. God knows I am innocent—that's all I have to say.—I thank Mr. Peters for his kindness to me. That's all I have to say."

His Lordship then addressed the prisoner at some length, and sentenced him to be hanged by the neck on Thursday, the 11th day of March next, between the hours of eight o'clock in the morning and four o'clock in the afternoon.

While passing sentence, his Lordship and many in the audience were visibly affected.

The prisoner was paler than usual, but quite steady; and when His Lordship had concluded, he said in a firm voice: "I hope that those who have been looking for the \$1,000 reward will enjoy it."

The Court was overcrowded with spectators, and the crush at the doors was tremendous.

It is rumored John Walsh will be Lord Chancellor of Ireland, McDermott, Attorney-General of Ireland, and Hemphill, Solicitor-General of Ireland.
