DECREASE OF LEPROSY.—An Ottawa despatch says: Dr. Smith, in charge of the lazaretto at Tracadie, N. B., reports that on January 1st, there were twenty two lepers under treatment in that institution, eleven males and eleven females. During the year, six new cases were admitted and two patients. He states that for several years no lepers have been admitted from Tracadie district, the new cases being from outlying districts, to which the relatives of leprosy persons in Tracadie had removed years ago. They were ferreted out by the doctor and removed in the face of determined opposition. Dr. Smith thinks that leprosy has been finally stamped out in the Tracadie district, so long its home, and attributes this result, entirely to segregation.
