



Dale Long Moves Up In National League Batting Race: Kaline Leads American

NEW YORK, (AP)—Pittsburgh's first baseman Dale Long, who has had a brief, but turbulent Major League career, has closed in on the leaders in the National League batting race.

With 13 hits in his last 32 times at bat, a .403 pace, Long has increased his average 24 points to .328, good for third place. He trails only Philadelphia's Richie Ashburn, the pace-setter at .351 and Cincinnati's Ted Kluszewski, in second place with .332. Ashburn dropped seven points last week, while Kluszewski lost three points.

Long, who slumped 37 points to .341, Kaline had 10 hits in 22 trips and Kuenn only four in 22 trips in 29 times at bat. Vic Power of Kansas City is third with .324, followed by Sherm Lollar of Chicago with .317, Mickey Vernon of Washington with .308 and Mickey Mantle of New York with .305. Mantle and Gus Zernial of Kansas City share the home run lead with 14 each.

Long, shortly after Pittsburgh drafted him from Kansas City of the American Association in 1951, became the central figure in the famed Branch Rickey experiment which aimed at converting the lefty-throwing Long into a catcher. The experiment failed and Long returned to first base and was sold to the St. Louis Browns.

Bobby Lund touched off a double play in the first inning when he made a nice grab of Willie Dunn's line drive and caught Handrahan leading off first. As anybody who's been up to our lot knows, we have a range of cars from the practical to the posh. Our place is like an automobile super-market, you can find just about anything you want in a used car.

Sometimes, for the fun of it, I like to plan what a used car lot would look like if it offered every make of car that's been on the market. There would be some strange shapes; most of us can remember the Auburn, the Moon, Franklin, Pierce-Arrow and have heard of the Stanley Steamer and the Detroit Electric. We'd also have to make room for some of the noble experiments that flopped, such as the Cord and the Tucker.

But if we really wanted to do a job of it, our historical used car lot would have to have more than 4,000 different makes of cars on it.

In years past I've won a few bets on which country the oldest car would be from. The first practical self-propelled motor car with an internal combustion engine came not from the States, or England, but from France and it sported and popped its way along the street in 1888.

Since then, more than 1,500 kinds of cars have been made in the United States, 610 in Great Britain and 480 in France. Even Belgium has had 70 different makes of cars.

Of the American makes, only 20 or so of the best have survived, and of those best, we think only the cream of the bunch came to our lot. Before a car can make the grade to be displayed at our place, we put it through all the tests to find out the things you'll want to know when, later on, you're looking it over.
