

Howard Chills Hayden To Retain Lightweight Title

HALIFAX (CP)—Richard (Kid) Howard of Halifax retained his Canadian lightweight boxing title with a one punch seventh round knockout over Jackie Hayden of Westville, N.S., Tuesday.

Howard dropped the challenger at 1:38 with a paralyzing left to the body that draped Hayden over the ropes. The challenger was on his knees at nine but unable to make his feet without assistance.

Both fighters weighed in at 133½ for the scheduled 12 rounds before a crowd of 5,200.

The champion displayed a punching power that floored Hayden in the fourth when jolting left and right hooks crumpled him to the canvas. He got to his feet at nine and clung to the champ for the remaining seconds of the round.

The challenger opened fast and forced Howard in the first round, but this was the only round in which Hayden held an edge.

The fifth round appeared even. Howard, after hammering Hayden in the fourth, seemed a little arm weary and the challenger held him off with a straight left.

Howard was unmarked while Hayden, cut under the right eye in the third, was bleeding from the nose.

The champion, making his first defence of the title since winning it in 1954, appeared slow in the first two rounds.

In the third he started beating Hayden on the counter-punching and from there on it was his fight.

Hayden seemed tired in the sixth and Howard bounced out at the bell for the seventh. He caught Hayden in the ropes with a drove him into the ropes with a right to the head. Howard followed fast with a flat-footed left that doubled Hayden on the ropes.

LeRoy Jones, 130½, of Halifax, scored a fifth round knockout over Rufus Graham, 132, of Bedford, Mass., in a scheduled six-round semi-final.

Jones, floors Graham three times in the fifth and he failed to make his feet at 2:28 in the round.

In a special six-round match Gordie McDougall, 160, Sydney, was awarded a split decision over Bob Jones of Stratford, Ont., and Halifax.

Furgol Disagrees With Hogan But Proves Himself Wrong

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP)—Outspoken Ed Furgol took a back-handed slap at Ben Hogan Tuesday and then uncorked a brilliant three-under-par 67 in practice for the U.S. open golf championship starting Thursday.

Discussing Hogan's statement that the Oak Hill Country Club course is one of the easiest ever for an open, the lame-armed 1954 champion from St. Louis commented:

"I think it's absurd for anybody to call Oak Hill easy. It's a course that requires a lot of good shots and headwork. The scores will be higher than anyone expects."

Then, as if contradicting himself, Furgol, whose left arm is 10 inches shorter than his right, proceeded to go around the 6,902-yard course in 34:42-67. Par is 35-35-70.

The U.S. Golf Association, always proud of the stern test of its championships, took immediate measures to inject teeth in the layout.

Officials announced that the frays and rough areas would be thoroughly watered before Thursday's teoff and that the greens would be kept dry and shaved to concrete hardness. The traps, with imported seashore sand, will be furrowed.

TIGERS DUMP ORIOLES

Yanks Trip Chisox 4-2; Boston Beats Tribe 9-7

NEW YORK (AP)—Andy Carey's three runs batted in on a homer and a single gave New York Yankees a 4-2 win Tuesday night and their sixth victory in six starts against Chicago White Sox. Southpaw Whitey Ford, not allowing a hit until the seventh inning, won his eighth against three defeats on a four-hitter.

The victory padded the Yankees' American League lead to 4½ games as runnerup Cleveland lost at Boston. The third-place White Sox now are five games back.

Ford, who had lost his last two previous starts, permitted only two base runners until the seventh, when the White Sox scored both their runs on four singles.

Dick Donovan was the losing pitcher.

BOSTON (AP)—Boston Red Sox defeated Cleveland 9-7 Tuesday night on a five-run uprising highlighted by Ted Lepcio's three-run homer. The 'ow followed Ted Williams' score-tying double to left that foiled the shift.

Boston's pair of Teds drove in three runs apiece but had to share honors with little Billy Klaus whose fine play at third ended the Indians' two-run eighth.

Boston was behind 5-4 in the seventh when Klaus got the second of his three hits—a single. Williams stepped into a pitch by loser Early Wynn and punched a double to the left field corner with the defence—as always—moved drastically to the right side. Klaus came all the way around to make it 5-5.

After Wynn walked Mickey Vernon intentionally, Lepcio teed off for his second homer of the year. Pete Daley, who had singled in a run in the first, followed with his third home run of the campaign.

CINCINNATI (AP)—Pittsburgh Pirates took the National League lead away from Cincinnati Reds Tuesday night with a 4-3 victory over the Reds on the strength of two two-run homers in the fifth inning and tight relief hurling by Roy Face. The Pirates had to squelch a ninth-inning Cincinnati rally to preserve their win.

Nelson King finished off the Reds in the ninth inning, relieving Face after Cincinnati catcher Ed Bailey belted a single and pinch hitter Smokey Burgess walked. King ended the rally with a force and a strikeout.

Face yielded only three hits after taking over for Bob Friend in the fifth inning.

Pirate scoring in their big fifth inning started when Jack Shepard pinched-hit a homer that scored catcher Hank Folle. Roberto Clemente put Pittsburgh ahead 4-3 with another homer.

British Win Over Germans At Equestrian Olympics

STOCKHOLM (AP)—British riders overcame a heavy defeat Tuesday to take first team place from the Germans in the dressage section of the equestrian Olympics' three-day trials. Canada was seventh among the 19 nations.

Conditions for the intricate movements and paces of the dressage were terrible as Lt. Col. Frank Weldon rode Kilbarry into the rectangular show area.

Rain was falling so hard that even visiting Queen Elizabeth threw up her hands in anguish. Rain on a slippery bridle, on the turf and on a horse's ears can wreck a dressage performance.

OVERCAME WEATHER
Col. Weldon and Kilbarry, who never have been lower than second in an international three-day trial, performed as if the weather was perfect, easily scoring low enough to give the British team the dressage section lead.

Britain's three riders totaled 313.2 penalty points to the 330.4 of the German team. Sweden took third with 346.4, Russia fourth with 359.2, Switzerland fifth, 366.8, Denmark sixth, 390.8 and Canada and the United States
