In the one mile handicap, Collings and Woods collided on the backstretch and both were thrown from their wheels, Woods having his damaged somewhat. Both riders were slightly shaken up.

Miss McDonald, after three years of successful work in connection with the school, has resigned much to the regret of her associate teachers, pupils and School Board.

REV. MR. SUTHERLAND'S CONDITION.—We deeply regret to learn that the Rev David Sutherland's condition is still very critical. He took a relapse on Thursday night and at that time all hopes of his recovery were abandoned. Yesterday he was very weak and low. This morning, however, medical attendants report a slight improvement with "a chance of recovery."

MONTRORSE HEARD FROM.—A telegram received by Reddin Bros today states that in the races at St Stephen yesterday, Montrose won second place in the 220 class beating Archibald, Katrina, Paul T, and all the others except Terril S, which won first place. Terril S, is a fast pacer from Boston. The race was for trotters and pacers. Montrose was driven by Mr. E. LeRoy Willis.

THE MONTH'S RECORD.—At the police court during the month of June there were 41 cases disposed of. There were 25 convictions for drunkenness, 5 for violating the Liquor Regulation Act, and 1 each for assault, vagrancy, malicious injuries to property and violating the Lord's Day Act. Three Liquor Regulation cases were dismissed, also one drunk, one vagrant and one malicious injuries to property prosecution. One larceny case was sent to the Supreme Court for trial. The receipts for the month amounted to \$302.78.

A monster open air meeting was held on the square after the return of the party.
