

Miners Defeat Moneyemen 5-2 To Tie Islanders For 2nd Spot In League

GLACE BAY, N.S., Feb. 3 (CP)—Glance Bay Miners' brashness and youth carried them to a second-place tie with Charlottetown Islanders Saturday, defeating Sydney Millionaires 5-2 in a Maritime Major or Hockey League game.

A partisan crowd of 3,178 fans saw Bud Polle's players climb to their highest position since the season began. Miners and Islanders now have 64 points each, two ahead of St. Mary's, who stopped Charlottetown in a rollicking game at Halifax.

And the long-standing feud blossomed again between the two Cape Breton clubs.

The first two periods produced only four penalties, two to each team. But fair-triggered tempers exploded in the third when 10 penalties were handed out, with Don (Red) McRae the principal offender by drawing minor misconduct and match misconduct penalties. At one time, Miners were short-handed three wavers through penalties. Glance Bay's defence kept Millionaires at bay, however, and managed to outshoot them by their largest margin, 11-5 in the period.
