TELEGRAPHIC NEWS. ENGLAND, ASIA AND AFRICA. LONDON, July 25. A Quetta despatch to the Times says that Ayoub Khan sent a message to Ameer Abdur Khaman's camp, inviting negotiations. A prominent chief and ardent partisan of the Ameer met Ayoub Khan's envoy half way between the camps to discuss terms of peace. The Ameer returned a spirited reply that he could listen to no propositions except at Herat, and ordered his generals to advance immediately and attack the enemy. The Ameer's generals believe that Ayoub Khan's message was only a pretext to gain time. The Times Tunis report says a telegram from Mascara states that chief Bon Amena has sent in two guns and a horse in token of submission. A telegram from Algiers states that Bon Amena's prestige is falling off, and that the natives assert that, after an incursion into Morocco, he will return home for good. The Times says that eighty Conservative Peers met at Lord Salisbury's house. Salisbury severely criticised the principles of the Land Bill, but recommended that no division be taken in the House of Lords on its second reading. Several amendments will be proposed. The opinion was held that the clause admitting leaseholders to the privileges of the bill ought to be eliminated. It was decided to meet again before the bill comes to the House of Lords. TUNIS, July 25. Further reinforcements numbering 1,800 men from France have arrived at Golletta, and have been conveyed to the neighborhood of Stax. Seventy-four Arab prisoners have started for Troulon.
