WE regret to learn that injuries received by Mr. Jeremiah Simpson, as referred to in our issue of yesterday, have terminated fatally. The real facts of the accident are as follows: Mr. Simpson was returning from New London to his home in Hope River, when, just as he was at his own gate, his horse, taking fright, became unmanageable. One of the shafts of the wagon having been broken, Mr. Simpson found it impossible to control the animal, and before he could think himself of what to do, he was pitched violently out against a stump of a tree. His little child, who was with him, was also thrown out, and its loud cries attracting attention, assistance was soon on the spot. The child was, strange to say, unhurt; but Mr. Simpson had received injuries from the effects of which he died this morning. It was found, on examination, that both his legs were broken near the thigh, and also his left arm. Dr. Jenkins, who was called in yesterday, found it impossible to do anything to relieve the wounded man's sufferings, he being too low for any attempt to be made in the way of setting the broken limbs. To his wife and family, as well as to his other relatives, we tender our sincere sympathy.

Pinette Bridge Notes.

The bridge here is in a very dangerous condition, and as this is the season in which most traffic is carried on, something should be done in the way of repairing it. We would beg to call the attention of the Commissioner of Public Works to it. He will confer a great benefit to this community by having it looked to immediately.

Capt. Malcolm McLeod is building a fine brig of 150 tons, which will shortly be launched. Charles McDonald, Orwell, is the foreman, and the manner in which the work is being pushed on reflects great credit upon him.

As the schooner "Conqueror" was towing some spars from Pictou for Capt. McLeod, the weather being stormy, and a high sea running, the towline parted. The spars which were supposed to have been lost, were found two days afterwards drifting in to Pinette River.

The farmers having secured the grain are now busily engaged at their fall ploughing.

A Sunday School has been started here this summer, and is conducted by Mr. J. J. McDonald and Mrs. R. W. Tremaine. There is a very large attendance. TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

The Woolwich Arsenal Explosion.

LONDON, Sept. 25. Rocket factories at the Arsenal, Woolwich, exploded yesterday. Many buildings were destroyed. The loss of life is serious. Old soldiers declare that the explosion of rockets was far more frightful than if it had occurred in actual siege. Some of the rockets were projected five miles. One went through the wall of the Arsenal, and another struck the Artillery Barracks. The explosion was caused by fire in the main building which included the laboratory. The building was destroyed within half an hour after the fire broke out. Two bodies of victims of the explosion have been recovered.

An International Sanitary Code.

LONDON, Sept. 25. All the Powers have accepted the proposal of Italy to summon a conference to be held at Rome to arrange an international sanitary code.

Mrs. Carey's Arrival at Plymouth.

LONDON, Sept. 25. Steamer "Garth Castle," from Capetown, with Mrs. Carey and other witnesses of the murder of James Carey has arrived at Plymouth.

A True Bill Found Against an Abortifacient.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. The Grand Jury at Sweetsburg has returned a true bill against Dr. Longley for murder in the abortion case of Mrs. McIntyre whose husband was acquitted as an accomplice.

Kicking Horse Pass.

TORONTO, Sept. 25. The latest intelligence indicates that Kicking Horse Pass is not the one to be adopted by the Canada Pacific authorities for crossing the Rockies, but a more northerly pass has been selected.

A Rumor.

OTTAWA, Sept. 25. It is stated that Mr. Whitcher, Commissioner of Fisheries, has been suspended from duty. The cause of the difficulty has not been disclosed.

The Jacques Cartier Contest.

QUEBEC, Sept. 25. The contest in Jacques Cartier is extremely bitter.

The Chinese Ambassador's Proposal.

PARIS, Sept. 26. Le Temps says the Marquis Tseng's proposals for the settlement of existing difficulties between China and France, comprised the annexation of Annam as far as Red River by the French, China annexing the remainder of Tonquin, and the Red River to be open to the commerce of the world. The French memorandum claims the entire delta with the exclusive control of navigation, and further demands a portion of the left bank of the Red River.

A Disastrous Storm.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 26. A disastrous storm occurred here last night, the wind at one time attained a velocity of fifty-four miles an hour. Trees and sign boards were blown down. The unfinished round house of the Rochester and Pittsburg Railroad was levelled to the ground. One fine residence was entirely demolished, and all the glass in many buildings broken.

General Bouet's Mission.

LONDON, Sept. 26. A despatch from Saigon, Cochinchina, states that General Bouet has sailed for France upon a mission solicited by himself to inform the French Government of the real position of affairs in Tonquin.

A Railway Train Wrecked.

BUCHAREST, Sept. 26. A railway train from Paris for Constantinople was thrown from the track near Vericiorova, demolishing several carriages and killing and wounding a number of persons.

The New Lord Mayor of London.

LONDON, Sept. 26. Mr. Simon Charles Hodley, Alderman for Castle Baynard Ward, was yesterday elected Lord Mayor of London.

The Exchange Bank Failure.

MONTREAL, Sept. 26. The Exchange Bank, in Montreal, has stopped the redemption of its bills. The amount paid out so far is very small.

Notes From Ottawa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 26. The Vice-Regal Party has returned. Prince George is to visit Niagara, Long Point and Lake Erie, for duck shooting, and then returns to Montreal.

Among the rumors in circulation is one to the effect that Hon. J. H. Pope is to be made Minister of Railways and Canals and Peter White, M. P., to succeed him as Minister of Agriculture.

The gale of last night seems to have been general throughout Canada, and much damage is reported.
