A FATAL ACCIDENT.

People Killed and Injured at Bar Harbor, Maine.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

BAR HARBOR, Aug. 7.—While a crowd of excursionists were on their way to see the warships yesterday a gangway from the dock to the boat at the Mount Desert Ferry broke, precipitating more than one hundred into the water.

Twenty bodies have been recovered, and it is estimated that the dead will number thirty or more.

OTHER ACCIDENTS.

Adding to Yesterday's Record of Lives Lost

BRUSSELS, Aug. 7.—In an explosion in a quarry at Ciney, Province of Vanure, six men were killed and five others injured yesterday on the Seaview Electric Railway running between Wickfore and Narragansett Pier, which resulted in the death of Merritt Lyman Abbey, aged 50 years, motorman of the Southbound trolley, who was crushed between the two cars.

There were forty passengers on the two cars, only one of whom was injured.

FATAL COLLISION.

Seventeen Killed and Thirty-Seven People Injured.

PARIS, Aug. 7.—Seventeen persons were killed and thirty seven injured in the collision last evening on the Orleans Railway at Juvisy.

Empress and Emperor.

LONDON, Aug. 6.—The Daily Telegraph, which announces that the Emperor William will soon pay a visit to the Queen, comments editorially upon the fact, as disposing of the rumors that the Emperor is trying to form a European coalition against Great Britain, as 'showing the continued good relations between the two countries.' The paper thinks the visit will be 'productive in clearing up small misunderstandings.'

Transvaal Conference.

PRETORIA, Aug. 5.—Herr Ficher, the special agent of Orange Free State, has arrived here to confer with the Transvaal government presumably with the view of an altered situation resulting with the message from the British secretary of state for the colonies, regarding the appointment for a joint commission to enquire into the effect which the new franchise proposals of the Transvaal government will have on the Outlanders.

She leaves to mourn their loss besides her husband, three children, two daughters and one son, the eldest daughter, Sadie, a graduate (99) of the state Normal school.

[The deceased lady referred to above, left the Island 34 years ago, and leaves behind her three sisters, Mrs. W. P. Colwill, Mrs. W. F. Fraser, Mrs. R. Frizzell and Mrs. W. T. Pillman, of Seattle, U. S., her father, mother and three brothers having passed on to join the great majority before her.

THE GODERICH ELECTION FRAUD

The Case Conclusive Against Grits

THE OTTAWA FREE PRESS THROWS UP THE SPONGE.

Mr. Davin Questions the Premier About His Invitation.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

OTTAWA, August 7.—In the privileges and elections committee on Saturday Mr. Borden went on calling witnesses who voted at Farr's poll in Goderich and whose ballots are alleged to have been replaced by ballots for Holmes.

It was arranged that no more witnesses be called after Monday.

The House will probably complete its work on Wednesday and a report will have to be prepared covering so much of the investigation as has been accomplished. The inquiry will cover only two polls of West Huron and will not reach Brockville.

The case made is so conclusive, that following the Toronto Globe of Friday, the Free Press, the government organ here, throws up the sponge.

Speaking of the latest disclosure the Free Press says that Holmes has been placed in an unfortunate position by his friends, and that his tenure of the seat is now so compromised that he cannot continue to occupy it with satisfaction to his self-respect.

Just before the House closed at midnight Mr. Davin asked the Premier about the statement reported in the press as made by F. W. Fitzpatrick, of the United States treasury department, who said he had been at Ottawa on behalf of Chicago's citizens to invite the Governor General and Premier Laurier to assist at the corner stone laying of the post office building at Chicago in October.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier: "I have nothing to say. I move the adjournment of the House.

More Men for Manila.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5.—It appears probable from developments during the past two days in the War Department that Secretary Root has in contemplation an army of quite 40,000 men for the Philippines. While Mr. Root has been at the head of the department only a brief time, he has been making diligent enquiries among the bureau chiefs regarding supplies and equipments, and the trend of this questioning has been available in the direction of an increase in the available force in the Eastern archipelago.

THIRTY PEOPLE KILLED.

And Many Injured in a Trolley-Car Accident.

BRIDGEPORT, CONN., Aug. 7.—A trolley-car filled with passengers, running between Shelton and Bridgeport, ran off the trestle at Ornoque Bridge, a short distance from Stratford, and fell sixty feet yesterday.

Thirty people were killed and many were injured.

The Dreyfus Case.

PARIS, Aug. 5.—It appears that the Minister of War, General the Marquis de Gallifet, has absolved all military witnesses at the court-martial of Captain Dreyfus at Rennes from professional secrecy, with the exception that he has requested them not to divulge the names of French agents abroad or disclose anything which would complicate the foreign relations of France.

By a conservative calculation it is estimated that a million dollars is taken in annually by the four lottery associations, now operating in Montreal. When it is known that the ordinary players chances are only as one against 75,000 in favor of the policy company, there can be no surprise that the profits are enormous.

The extremely hot weather in England last week prevented the sales of cattle from being large, but reports do not appear gloomy. The cheese trade of the week indicates a feeling of confidence among holders, and the same may be said of the butter market. An advance of five cents per one hundred pounds on refined sugar has been decided upon by the refiners.

There was a fair house at the Academy last evening to see the moving pictures of the scenes from the Passion Play as given by the peasants of Hofitz, Bohemia, and they proved most interesting, the entertainment being rendered more so by the solos by Mrs. Hagarty. Several times the audience broke into applause and the lecturer had to request that no demonstration be made until the pictures had been concluded. Preceding the scenes the lecturer gave explanations and dates, and the more interesting incidents in the life of Christ as pictured by the machine were referred to while in view of the audience. At the close the audience loudly applauded the entertainment.
