Richard Davies Is Golf Winner

Richard (Boom Boom) Davies of the British amateur golf championship by one hole.

HOYLAKE, England (CP) — Richard (Boom Boom) Davies outlasted Welshman John Poyvall Saturday to win the British amateur golf championship by one hole.

The 31-year-old Pasadena, Calif. real estate man let out a big war whoop and ran over to give a bear hug to Poyvall, a big-hearted loser, after wrapping up the struggle on the 36th hole.

Davies, eighth American to win this coveted trophy since the Second World War, won four of the first five holes in the morning round on the 6,500-yard Hoylake course and seemed destined to make a runaway of the contest.

But Poyvall, a 23-year-old former professional reinstated to amateur ranks, kept plugging away. He couldn't hole any one of a difficult putt in the first nine, but was only two down in 18.

Both men played poorly and went well above the Hoylake par of 76-72 in the morning. Poyvall took 82 strokes and Davies 81.

In the afternoon it looked for Davies to win, but he was a time as though the short, fair-haired Poyvall would win again as a giant-killer from Cardiff. He tore into the six-foot-two-inch Davies with great determination and won the 36th, 21st, 22nd and 33rd holes to change completely the complexion of the match.

Poyvall was two up and Davies got it came back under control. He won the 24th with a par four while the Welshman put his second shot in the rough and scrambled for a five.

MONCTON (CP) — Harvey Cormier, veteran harness racing rider, remained unconscious in hospital here Sunday 24 hours after a spectacular six-horse pileup at the Moncton racetrack.

Cormier, leading dash winner in the Maritimes two years ago, suffered concussion, a fractured nose and possible internal injuries. His condition was serious.

The pileup developed shortly after the horses reached the halfway mark in the seventh race. Cormier, driving Junior Frank, was apparently attempting to pass the leader — Dorothy T — when Junior Frank's leg became locked in Dorothy T's bike.

Inggo Captures European Title

GOTEBORG (AP) — Ingemar Johansson of Sweden crashed two terrific rights onto the jaw of Welshman Dick Richardson and won the European heavyweight championship in the eighth round before 35,000 avid spectators here Sunday night.

Hot steam streaming from a cut in the corner of his left eye, Johansson sent Richardson slumping backward on his comb-over for a count of eight.

The big Welshman, defending his title for the fourth time, rose to his feet and Johansson stormed in with another pulverizing right which dropped Richardson like a stone.

The Welshman rolled over on his back out cold. The time was two minutes, 18 seconds of the eighth round in the scheduled 15-round contest.

CROWD GOES BERSERK
The Swedish crowd went berserk with delight as French referee Pierre Ferrier counted out the unconscious Welshman. It was the first time Richardson had been beaten on the European continent.

For Johansson, it was a big step forward on his comeback to Floyd Patterson in 1960 and failed to regain in 1961.

Johansson, 29, is 5-11 and 202 pounds. Richardson, 30, is 5-10 and 200 pounds.

The Swede appeared to be in command from the start although he suffered a cut over his left eye in the sixth round.
