The New South Wales Governorship.

The Right Hon. Sir Augustus William Frederick Spencer, commonly called Lord Augustus Loftus, has been appointed Governor of New South Wales, to replace Sir H. G. R. Robinson. As announced Lord Loftus is succeeded by the Earl of Dufferin in the the ambassadorship at St. Petersburg.

Letter from Sir Wilfrid Lawson, M. P.

Sir Wilfrid Lawson, in a letter to the Rev. Thomas Gales, Secretary of the Dominion Alliance, says:—

"I shall look with the greatest interest for reports of the adoption and working of your new law (the Canada Temperance Act). I am sure that the Canadian Temperance reformers who have the matter in charge will feel that not only the welfare of your own country, but also the rapid progress of temperance reform in many other countries depends to a very large degree on the success of this Canadian experiment—if, indeed, it ought to be called an experiment. You will have many enemies doing their best—or worst—to make the thing a failure, and also ready to fasten on any fact which may be made to make it appear to be a failure. But work and patience will make all right."

Stimulants in Cold Weather.

A correspondent of the "Echo" says:— "Nothing is more common in these days of severe weather than to see persons taking spirits, beer, etc., to keep out the cold. To those whose knowledge of physiology is so limited as not to be aware that nutritious food and warm clothing are the best specifics against the cold, perhaps the following remarks of DeQuincy may be of service:— "Plato notices one effect which invariably follows from the addiction to strong liquors, even where as yet they have not mastered the constitutional vigor, viz., their tendency to produce a morbid sensibility to cold. We ourselves have seen a large party of stout men travelling on a morning of intense severity. Amongst the whole number, eight or nine, there were only two who did not occasionally shiver, or express some unpleasant feeling connected with the cold; and these two were the sole water drinkers of the party."

Lost Sight Restored by Prayer.

WILMINGTON, Del., Feb. 5.—Miss Minnie Lombard, nineteen years old, residing on Jefferson street, this city, who has been blind for two years has recovered her sight in a most remarkable manner. She was afflicted with Typhoid fever, and on her recovery she gradually lost her sight and became totally blind. She was given the best medical treatment, but without avail. She is a member of St. Paul's M. E. Church, and the Church has made her case a subject of prayer. On Tuesday night last, previous to retiring, Miss Lombard had been reading of Christ restoring sight to the blind and the promise "Whatever ye shall ask in my name, believing, ye shall receive," and with a full reliance in his power and wisdom she prayed earnestly that if it be his will her own eyes might be re-opened. She awoke with a headache. Her mother bathed her head and she fell asleep again. When she awoke her sight was perfectly restored. She is a consistent Christian and naturally attributes her sudden recovery to a special interposition of Providence.

A frightful sickness prevails among the Russian troops at Adrianople.

Lord Lyons, British Ambassador at Paris, will give a banquet to President Grevy next week.

The general proceeds of the fisheries of British Columbia for the year 1878 amounted to \$924,432.76, an increase as compared with 1877 of \$342,334.22.
