Death At S'side Last Night Of Mr. Keith Cameron

The death occurred suddenly at his home in Summerside last evening of Mr. Keith Cameron. He was 68 years of age. He had been in failing health for some time but had only been confined to bed for the past week. It was not considered by his family that his condition was serious and his death from a heart condition came with shocking suddenness.

The late Mr. Cameron was born at Hampton, a son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Benjamin Cameron of that place. He attended school at Carleton and then came to Summerside to work for the firm of MacGougan and Wright. In 1906 he went to Western Canada and lived for a number of years in Halbrite, Saskatchewan.

He returned to Summerside about the year 1914 and has lived here ever since. After working for a short time with R. T. Holman Ltd., he entered the employ of Sinclair and Stewart Ltd. and remained with that firm and its successor, Smallman's Ltd., till his retirement in October, 1949.

With Sinclair and Stewart Ltd. he was the competent manager of the men's wear department and also looked after the advertising for the firm. Mr. Cameron was an active Oddfellow and was a Past Noble Grand of Prince Edward Lodge, I. O. O. F.

Apart from his fraternal activities he devoted himself mostly to his home and family. He is survived by his wife, the former Adella Mill of Clermont, and one son and three daughters all in Summerside. They are: Franklin, Mrs. Jessie Cook, Jean, Mrs. Frank McInnis and Mrs. Margaret Rankin. A brother also survives him, George W. Cameron, of Amherst N. S.

The funeral service will be held at two o'clock Saturday afternoon from the home.—S

an administrative committee of two is provided for to deal with routine administration and administrative functions, more general questions having to be dealt with by the Executive Committee.

There are four County associations, including East and West Prince, as before, as well as County executives; also a district organization and district executive for each of the electoral districts of the Province. Each of these various types of organization may appoint a member as its secretary or non-voting secretary from outside its membership.

Pol committees are elected annually, the retiring chairman possibly reviewing his work in the press or advertisement in the press one week before the meeting. Only accredited delegates may vote at meetings and conventions and only accredited delegates may address such meetings unless special permission is granted by the chairman.

This latter provision was objected to in a letter of Col. E. A. Strong which was read by Mr. Mathieson. Major MacDonald pointed out that chairmen can be expected to be generous in granting such permission and it was retained.

On motion of Mr. Peter M. MacCaull, seconded by Mr. Charles Phillips, the constitution was adopted as amended.

The measure was piloted through by Mr. G. R. Foster with Mr. David L. Mathieson, M. L. A., providing information on the drafting and on differences between the new constitution and comparable sections previously in force.

Three chairmen alternated during the course of the convention, Messrs. J. F. Arnett, Beagh Bagnall and Melvin J. MacQuaid. Mr. Bagnall called the meeting to order and read the notice summoning the convention and turned the meeting over to Mr. Arnett who spoke warmly of the high standards set by Dr. MacMillan, leader of the party. Mr. G. R. Foster then called the meeting to order and read the new constitution, clause by clause.

The resolutions adopted by the convention are reported elsewhere.

"As I look around your faces tonight, I wouldn't be a bit frightened to stand before you as a candidate again," he declared. "However, I have decided to hand you back the mantle of leadership and ask you to place it on younger shoulders. Upon you now rests the responsibility of picking someone who will succeed me. I thank you very sincerely for your loyalty in the past."

Later, after reviewing his years in public life, Dr. MacMillan referred appreciatively to the strong support he had received from the Protestant voters of Charlottetown and to the fact that he had always sought to avoid religious discrimination in appointments to government offices.

He pointed out that in the last election the Conservatives had taken nearly 50 per cent of the votes, notwithstanding that they only succeeded in electing six candidates. He was confident that a little more effort at the polls would result next time in victory for the Conservatives.

He stressed particularly the Province's subsidy claims at Ottawa, and said that so long as he has anything to do with the party he would urge that these claims be pressed vigorously.

Boy Scouts Honors List Is Issued

OTTAWA, June 30—(CP)—Two veteran Boy Scout officials were awarded the Silver Wolf, scouting's highest honor for service, in a Dominion Day honors list issued tonight by Canada's Chief Scout, Viscount Alexander.

A total of 38 scouts from Vancouver to St. John's, Newfoundland, were honored by the Governor-General.

Seventeen Ontario scouts took the lion's share of the awards with 11 going to scouts in Quebec; British Columbia and Nova Scotia, three each; and Newfoundland and New Brunswick, one apiece.

Archbishop Philip Carrington of Quebec City and Malcolm Lyon Douglas of Brockville, Ont., are the winners of the high awards, given "for services of exceptional character"—normally of national importance. The decoration, a silver wolf hanging from a green and yellow ribbon, is worn around the neck.

A scout since 1909, Mr. Douglas organized the local associations of Boy Scouts at Kitchener, Ont., and Brockville and has held several executive positions in the movement.

Archbishop Carrington entered scouting as an assistant scoutmaster at Christchurch, New Zealand, in 1910.

He is a former leader of the Bishop's Rover Crew at Lennoxville, Que., and in 1932 was chosen district Rover leader and later district commissioner for Sherbrooke, Stanstead Counties and the Eastern Townships.

The Silver Cross, second highest scouting award for gallantry, went to 15-year-old Gordon Dwyer Smith of New Glasgow, N. S., for "his presence of mind and gallantry in going to the assistance of a man who had been caught by the tide while bathing at Melmerby Beach on Northumberland Strait."

Andrew Avison, 14-year-old member of the Silverton, B. C., troop was awarded the Gilt Cross for his attempt to rescue two companions from drowning in Lake Skeon last February.

Four members of the 32nd Windsor Troop, Windsor, Ont.—Patrol Leader William Bryce, 15; Cub Dalton Edwards, 12; Scout Donald Moore, 15; and Patrol Leader Harold Turner, 14—each won the medal for meritorious conduct for "the prompt and efficient manner" in which they rendered assistance at the scene of an airplane crash.

Answers Query Re Seal Skins

OTTAWA, June 29—(CP)—Fisheries Minister Mayhew told the Commons today that seal skins cured in the United States did not always bring a higher price than Canadian-cured skins and he intended to give the Canadian fur industry a chance to show what it could do.

Replying to W. Chester S. McLure (P.C.-Queens), Mr. Mayhew said a firm in Toronto now was processing seal skins and he was sure the Government would be severely criticized if it interfered and did not give this new industry a chance.

Mr. McLure said U.S.-cured skins were bringing higher average prices than those processed in Canada. He believed finishing in Canada should be kept up to the standard of the United States to protect the reputation of Canadian skins.

Mr. Mayhew promised to get later information about the comparative cost of curing in St. Louis, Toronto and London. Eng. The Minister also told the House Canada had made a net profit of \$782,000 last year on seals taken from the Pribiloff Islands in the Pacific under an international agreement with the United States. Under the treaty, each country is allotted a quota of seals from the Pribiloff herd annually.

Several island farmers were present to hear an informative address on "Improvement of Livestock through Breeding" by Dr. T. C. Byerly of Beltsville, Maryland.

Premier MacNair

New Brunswick's Premier, Hon. J. B. MacNair last night urged the Institute members to press on in their work so that the farmers could successfully handle the problems of soil and water conservation and combat flood waters.

The enemies of soil and water conservation he stated were the stripping of forests and hinterlands, fires, insects and disease.

The world, he stated, was faced with many shortages of food due to lack of scientific know-how.

After beginning his spot talk in a humorous vein, Premier MacNair reviewed the growth of the Institute. He concluded by expressing his appreciation of the part they play in the agricultural role.

Hon. A. W. MacKenzie, Minister of Agriculture and Marketing for Nova Scotia thanked Premier MacNair. Others who spoke were Mr. G. B. Crossie, St. John's Newfoundland and Dr. F. J. Greenay, Winnipeg.

Other guests at the head table were: His Honor Lieutenant Governor J. A. Bernard and Mrs. Bernard; His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald; Mr. W. R. Carroll of Toronto who takes over the presidency of the Institute today; Hon. C. C. Baker, Minister of Agriculture; Mr. H. W. Clay; Mr. and Mrs. R. C. Parent and Hon. J. K. King, Minister of Agriculture for N. B.
