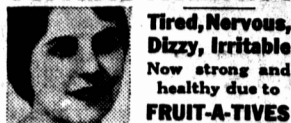

Famous Picture of King "Shot" At Quoit Club

HALIFAX, April 13.—(CP)—There is a plot of ground on Dalhousie University Studley Campus where students dare not tread, a fenced-off portion of land over which members of the ancient and honorable society of ring-throwers, known as the Studley Quoit Club, have undisputed and singular property rights.

The Studley Quoit Club is just as much a part of Halifax as its star-pointed Citadel. It is a link with glorious military and naval days of the past, with royalty and distinguished foreign visitors. The famous photograph of King Edward VIII captioned "The Smiling Prince" was snapped as he joked with Club members here on his visit as Prince of Wales in 1919.

Fly Naval Ensign

Club quarters are unpretentious. Marquees are pitched and a large white Naval Ensign flies over players on club days throughout the summer.

The society was formed back in 1858 and play has continued since. The owner of the Studley grounds, Miss Antoinette Nordbeck gave permission for the members to use part of her property and today they possess something better than squatter's rights.

J. W. Wyde who was president from 1875 until 1898 presented the club with a sterling silver Punch Bowl which is still in use with the provisions "that the Punch Bowl be held by the Studley Quoit Club in perpetuity whilst holding together as an organization."

On August 7, 1873, the club held a Hodge Podge on its grounds in honor of the Marquis of Lorne Governor General of Canada. He presented a silver medal for quoit competition.

Captain Harold Cummings of the Royal West Kent Regiment remembered the club from previous visits to Halifax and when stationed in Egypt in 1883 donated a handsome Silver Challenge Cup. The resolution in part of the records, thanking Captain Cumming for the gift is: "That it be filled to the brim with our ever flowing brew. The cup to be in perpetual memorial of his munificence, as

well as of his enthusiastic interest in the welfare of the Club." The Earl of Aberdeen was presented with a set of quoits on one of his official visits as Governor General. He donated a Silver Medal for annual competition.

Many Silver Trophies

Jugs and spoons and loving cups were presented by a long list of dignitaries. Lady Erskine on behalf of Vice Admiral Sir James E. Erskine gave the club a silver ladle. On this occasion the white Naval Ensign was run up the mast and it has fluttered on club competition days ever since.

Among the high-scorers have been Hon. W. S. Fielding, former premier of Nova Scotia and ex-Finance Minister of Canada; Prof. Howard Murray of the Classics Department, Dalhousie; one-time Lieutenant-Governor A. G. Jones and Mr. Justice Longley of the Supreme Court of Nova Scotia.

Concludes President Roper: "Studley Quoit grounds is a place where good fellows get together to enjoy in the open air the exercise of quoit pitching, mingled with reasonable social entertainment. It is one of the archives of Nova Scotia."

Mahaney Quadruplets Ready to Move

SAINT JOHN, N. B. April 14.—(CP)—When Canada's only quadruplets move from the home that has sheltered them during the past few years to another house within a few days they'll be hoping that fortune will smile on them a little more kindly in their new surroundings.

The quadruplets, three girls and a boy, children of Mr. and Mrs. William Mahaney, Saint John, have discovered there's a great difference between being Canada's only quadruplets and the world's only quintuplets. Largely forgotten for years, the "quads", 12 years old last Christmas Day were forced still further into the background when the more fortunate Dionnes arrived.

Their father out of work, facing ejection from their home, the quadruplets were facing a cheerless Christmas-birthday when a newspaperman visited them last December. Their story was told in newspapers across Canada. Kind-hearted people came to their rescue. The four, Edith May, Edna Louise, Lydia Christine and John Douglas, were aided.

Out of the contributions, some \$150 in all, a fund was placed in the hands of Ven. Archdeacon Cody, of St. James Church, which the Mahaney family attends, and Charles McDonald, a retired Saint John accountant, out of the fund they paid rent and provided food and clothing. When the father of the children was able to find work, he aided. Now the fund is almost exhausted. From Bridgewater, N. S., where Mrs. Mahaney was born, has come an offer for the children to take part in a concert this summer.

Missed Prize Essay Through Plagiarism

NEW YORK, April 14.—(A.P.)—Eighteen-year-old Lloyd Lewis, of Plattsburg, Mo., sat in a Manhattan skyscraper office tonight and saw his dream of a college education swept away because he didn't understand the meaning of plagiarism.

Lloyd, announced as the winner of a \$5,000 prize essay contest sponsored by Eddie Cantor, the comedian, seemed nothing but bewildered as Cantor's agent told him he was disqualified from the prize because he had plagiarized, word for word, part of an article written several months ago by Dr. Frank Kingdon, President of Neward University, for a magazine.

Cantor's contest was for a peace essay, and Dr. Kingdon's article had been on the same subject. Wide-eyed, the farm youth turned to questioners. "What is plagiarism?" he asked. "I don't know what it means."

Informed, he readily admitted copying Dr. Kingdon's article and submitting it as his own in the contest which he entered as a junior in the Plattsburg High School. "Sure, I copied the article," he told his astounded audience, "I don't see anything wrong in that. It was much better than I could have done and honestly I don't see anything wrong in it."

Cantor's agent, Ben F. Holzman, said that Lloyd would be sent back to Plattsburg by plane tonight with his transportation paid. From a list of 13 other finalists in the contest for which over 20,000 entries were received the judges will select another winner.

Cantor, in a prepared statement said: "I feel badly—it's a terrible thing. I don't think the boy though he was doing anything that wasn't on the square. He was trying to get a college education. I'd hate to have him suffer from what seems, on the surface, an honest mistake, but of course he does not get the college scholarship."

In Newark, where the plagiarism was first discovered by a newspaper, Dr. Kingdon was inclined to take the matter lightly. He said he was flattered that the judges, four college presidents, had deemed his essay of such note.

WESTERN ISSUES SHOWED REACTION

TORONTO, April 14.—(CP)—While Dominion and eastern provincial bond issues continue to maintain a note of stability with prices somewhat higher than a month ago, western provincial bonds reacted unfavorably to the developments in Alberta where a provincial issue of \$3,200,000 maturing April 1 was not paid, says the monthly review of Wood Gundy and Company.

The interest was paid and negotiations are proceeding between the federal minister of finance and Premier Aberhart of Alberta in an effort to reach a solution, the provincial premier having failed to accept the Loan Council conditions on which further federal aid can be obtained.

New bond issues are mainly for refunding purposes and therefore

the total shows little if any increase, says the Review.

EAST INDIANS HOLD BURBAR

PORT OF SPAIN, Trinidad, Apr. 14. (CP)—In this busy metropolis of the Caribbean far away from their teeming country thousands of Muslim Indians held a Durbar recently and garlanded His Excellency Governor Sir A. Claud Hollis.

In a speech to the throng celebrating the festival, the first Trinidad governor to be so recognized advised them to "pay no heed to agitators" who would incite them to strike and commit acts of lawlessness. The Durbar was celebrated

jointly by the East Indian National Congress, the Hindu Sanatan Dharam Association, the Tack-veeyatul Islamic Association, the Kabir Panthi Association and the Arya Samaj Association.

KINGSTON, Jamaica, April 14.—(CP)—Prospects of increased business for lime growers of Jamaica were seen here in the announcement Poland has agreed to allow fruit for pineapples and lemons in the agreement between Poland and England signed at London Feb. 27, 1935. The quota amounts to 841,930 kilograms.

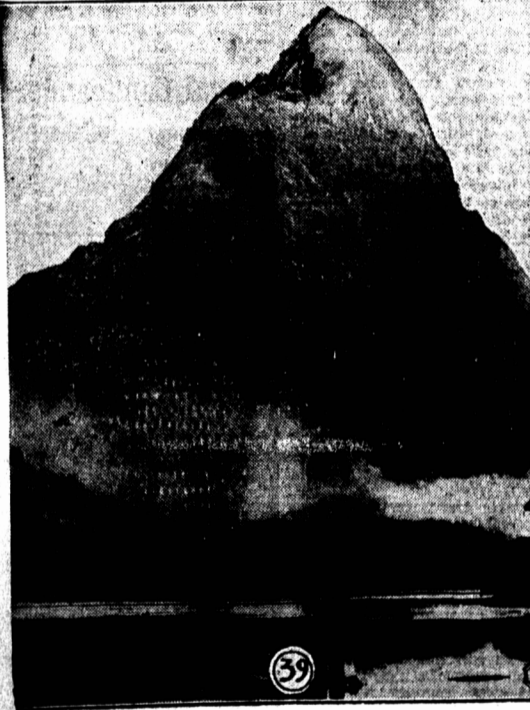
