Difficult To Understand

IT'S DIFFICULT to understand why players who have terrific performances in the American Hockey League, Eastern Pro League and the Western League, just can't make a go of it with their "real NHL" clubs.

Take Gordie Fielder, the veteran Seattle Totems' forward, as an example. Tuesday night his 32-year-old Fielder boosted his lifetime professional scoring total to 1,001 points by picking up three assists in a game which saw the Totems defeat Vancouver Canucks 4-4.

Other active players, Detroit's Gordie Howe in the National League and Cleveland's Fred Grover in the American League broke through the NHL barrier.

Yet the 32-year-old Fielder has been brought up at least twice by the New York Rangers and failed to make the grade. Former Merker, former Maple Leaf coach, who conducted the hockey school here this year, told us that when Fielder was called up by the Blues he was the "Pitman terror" he didn't wish to play in the NHL and that he "would much rather be a big fish in a little pond than be a little fish in a big pond."

It's hard to understand the NHL's attitude in this type of player.

Another strange case is that of Bob Courcy, a star with Hull-Ottawa Canadiens in the EPHL. Sunday Courcy carried 31 goals and all by himself to a 4-1 victory over Kingston Frontenacs, scoring his last four goals in the final 10 minutes of play.

Yet the 28-year-old Courcy has had 21 goals and 34 assists.

WHY'S CARRYING the club this season and it doesn't surprise manager Sam Pollock, who says he is a natural National League player. Pollock has coached Courcy for three years.

Three years ago Courcy carried Hull-Ottawa to the playoffs with 46 goals and 102 points over a 70-game schedule.

To everyone else, Courcy was just baggage. In 278 games in pro hockey with other clubs and other coaches, he's scored only 79 goals all told. For Sam he has 67 goals in 98 games.

Courcy bounced from Shawinigan, to Chicoutimi, to the Three Rivers club and finally to Hull-Ottawa. This earned him a crack with the Black Hawks but early in training camp he was demoted to Buffalo, did nothing there and got such a small salary that he left for the Sea before he could get to Quebec Aces where he rode the bench early this season. Pollock had been protesting him from the Aces and once again he was sensational.

Pollock wonders why he flopped in the AHL, and why at 26 he has to guess his own mind every time he is asked to see you to see what he could do," says Sam. "He's a funny guy. You have to have patience with him at first, but it's a fine hockey player and you can get a lot of pleasure out of him. It just takes him a little time to get going. At his age he still could make it. It's a matter of how he's motivated."

Pollock is probably right. When he rejoined the Habs a couple of months ago, he said, "I'm glad to be here because here I'll get to play."
