**LYLOYD GEORGE FLAYS BALDWIN AND CABINET**

War-time Premier Critic of Government's Handling of Foreign Affairs.

DERRY, Eng., July 7.—(A.P.)—David Lloyd George, in a by-election speech, last night called Prime Minister Baldwin and his ministers "rats that scuttled the ship."

He flayed the cabinet particularly for its handling of international affairs, including the League of Nations and the Italo-Ethiopian dispute.

Lloyd George spoke at a meeting of the Council of Action for peace and reconstruction, in connection with the by-election campaign to fill the seat of J. H. Thomas, former colonial secretary who resigned from the House of Commons following the Budget leak.

"The battle for peace has been lost through feebleness and politeness on the part of the greatest nation in the world, through her leaders," the war-time Prime Minister declared.

He asked: "Who rattled?" When a man in the audience interjected: "Simon (Sir John Simon, the home secretary) Lloyd George retorted:

"Yes, well, that's the kind of an animal he is."

Later, apparently referring to Neville Chamberlain, Chancellor of the Exchequer, Lloyd George said: "Another great minister—I am told he is going to be the next prime minister—said 'Whatever happens, there will be no cowardly surrender.'"

He went on: "They bled, who rattled? Rats. I am told, desert a sinking ship. These are rats that scuttled the ship."

Depicting the British bulldog as one "who, without a single bite, not even a spot of blood, runs away with its tail between its legs," Lloyd George declared: "In Europe this Government isn't thought much of; in America they have lost confidence in us."

"I have seen many governments," he asserted, "but I have never seen any quite like this. If we do not pass through this greatest emergency that mankind ever has passed through, barring the Great War, it will be infinitely more catastrophic than the war."

Declaring the international situation more grave than in 1914, he added:

"I remember the situation then. Two or three months before war broke out there were none of those thunder-clouds gathering in the skies which you see now."

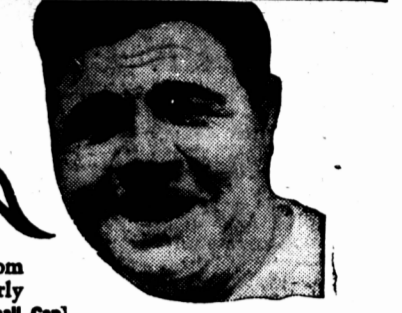

**Britain, Russia To Settle Differences By Private Conversations**

(A. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)  
MONTREAL, Switzerland, July 7.—Great Britain and Soviet Russia agreed today to try and settle their differences over the proposed Dardanelles Straits convention by private conversations.

Several minor clauses were adopted at the general conference here, but the Soviet Union, backed by Turkey, still was far from agreement with Britain.

Britain asks freedom of the straits in case of a war, in which Turkey is neutral, continuation of a form of the present straits commission and two weeks' notice to Turkey by all foreign nations intending to send warships through the straits.

The Russians continued their fight for free passage through the straits for all their warships, at the same time imposing limitations on non-Black Sea powers. Turkey suggested freedom of passage for all Russian warships now existent or to be built, but the British delegate objected, saying Britain wanted reciprocity.

The Russians also demanded their Black Sea fleet be increased

COPENHAGEN, Denmark, July 7.—The engagement of Mrs. Ruth Bryan Owen, United States minister to Denmark, and Captain Borge Rohde, 42-year-old honorary gentleman groom to the King of Denmark, became known today.

The wedding will take place in New York. The date, it was reported, will be tomorrow or Thursday; the place, the Long Island estate of Mrs. Owen's daughter, Mrs. Robert Lehman.

Mrs. Owen, 50 years old, the handsome daughter of William Jennings Bryan, is the United States' first woman minister plenipotentiary.

She reached the United States last Sunday.

**IN MEMORIAM**

**MR. JOHN A. DUNN**  
Coffin Island, Magdalen Islands, June 26, 1936.

John A. Dunn, the last to be recovered of the six young men drowned on April 17th when their boat capsized near the entrance to Grand Entry Harbour, was laid to rest today with his five companions in death.

Thus has ended the continuous search for bodies by sorrowing relatives and sympathetic friends which began immediately after the accident—the greatest tragedy ever known in the Magdalen Islands.

All of the men were Magdalen Islanders except Orrin C. Dingwell of Bay Fortune, P.E.I. who had arrived one week before and remained the guest of his brother-in-law and sister, Mr. and Mrs. Irvin Clark. The others were Foster Clark, Ray Dunn, John and Aubrey Dunn (brothers) and Baxter Turnbull, all from the little settlement of Old Harry, the home of each being less than a mile from that of the others. Henry Clark, the only survivor, also lives in Old Harry.

The people of Old Harry mourn the loss of the six fine young men who have gone from their midst but have been rewarded in at least one particular and that is that the bodies should all be found and that as in death they were not divided they agreed from the first that they should all be buried together in the little cemetery of Saint Peter's-by-the-Sea.
