A REPORT FROM QUEBEC.

Mr. Joseph F. Arsenault, M. L. A., of Wellington, arrived on Saturday from a two weeks' trip to the United States and Canadian cities. He was in Montreal during the Tupper-Foster-Macdonald demonstration. He attended the meeting at the Monument National, and he says that he never saw such enthusiasm as he witnessed there that night. The large building was packed, and Sir Charles not only got a splendid hearing but was cheered by the French-Canadians. Whilst he was speaking a clique of he-lers who were there for the purpose, tried to raise cheers for Laurier, but no one joined them and they had to leave the hall. He further says that though the grite claim that they will sweep Quebec, it is quite evident that they are speaking for effect, as all the indications point to a great change in favor of the Conservatives. In 1896 nothing was spoken of in the streets but "Laurier," "Laurier," and every meeting witnessed demonstrations at the name of Laurier. But this year it is quite different and Laurier's name evokes but little enthusiasm.

While Mr. Arsenault is a strong Conservative, he is not the man to be carried away by his feelings and prejudices to say that which is not; and, therefore, we place the most implicit reliance upon his report.

Subject: "Is the church responsible for the present popular religious indifference?" Rev. John Clark, of Tryon, will give an address, subject: "Is Christianity losing its influence?" and Rev. A. E. Pastors of churches, Superintendents of Sunday Schools, County and District Presidents, officers and Executive of the Provincial Association, are ex-officio members of Convention. Each school may send one delegate, and schools having a membership of over 100 may send two. Delegates who are not already members of convention as above will bring credential letter from the Superintendent or Pastor. If the Superintendent goes he will represent the school as a delegate. Professor Hamill and others prominent Sunday School workers will take part in the convention. The committee at Charlottetown promise entertainment to members of Convention and delegates provided the name is sent to the chairman, D. Schurman, not later than October 5th. There will be one first class fare by rail.
