MOVEMENTS OF THE FISHING FLEETS AND FISH RECEIPTS. -Codfish have been in proved receipt the past week, several Bank fares having been received, the receipts exceeding two million pounds for the fifth time this season. Mackerel have been in moderate and halibut in liberal receipt, 77 arrivals having been reported, as follows: -

Other receipts 5,000 lbs hake, 500 q's dry fish, 100 bbls fresh herring, 50 bbls halibut fish. For the corresponding week of last year, the receipts were 1,249,000 lbs of codfish, 427,400 lbs halibut, 25,170 lbs mackerel, 53,400 lbs swordfish, 3,000 lbs cusk and 40 bbls fresh herring. Last week the receipts were 939,000 lbs halibut, 8,571 lbs mackerel, and 11,000 lbs swordfish. -Cape Ann Advertiser.

The Journal remarks: -"New steel rails have been laid on the track between here and Charlottetown. The new rails weigh fifty pounds to the yard, while the old iron ones weighed but thirty. The rails were laid at the rate of one mile a day, and in an expeditious and thorough manner, which is highly creditable to Mr. McPherson, the Trackmaster. There have also lately been built a new station at Peake's, and a new dwelling-house for the Station Master at St. Peter's. These are both fine and substantial buildings, and will doubtless be appreciated by the settlements which they are to accommodate. On the whole, the Railway has never been in as high a state of efficiency as now. It must in justice to Mr. Coleman be said that he is most watchful and prompt in making necessary improvements, and during his term as Superintendent he has increased the facilities and efficiency of the road in a manner which the public fully recognizes."
