The Campaign.

While a fair and equitable representation for all parts of the city, on the basis of population, is the object of the civic reformers, there are other advantages that will attend the adoption of the city bill which cannot be too highly prized by the well-meaning people of Charlottetown.

Now the majority in Charlottetown comprise a class of men, honorable and self-respecting. They would scorn to be represented by rum-sellers, law-breakers and law-defiers. They may not all be temperance men, some may indulge in their glass and object to prohibitory temperance legislation.
