We quote granulated 6 1/2c to 7c, and yellows 4 1/2c to 5 1/2c.

FIRE IN GEORGETOWN

\$5000 Worth of Property Destroyed.

GEORGETOWN, July 28. A serious fire occurred in the store of Messrs. A. A. Macdonald Bros., Georgetown, last evening. It originated in the meat cellar at 7 o'clock, and was discovered a short time afterwards. The greatest portion of the stock in the building was removed, but was very much damaged; and the fire was extinguished after it had been burning four hours. The stock in the cellar and on the first floor was burnt. The damage to the stock is estimated at from four to five thousand dollars. It is covered by insurance in the Citizen and British American Companies. The damage to the building is estimated at about five hundred dollars. The citizens—men, women and children—and strangers attending the Supreme Court, as well as members of the Bar, worked heroically, otherwise the building and all its contents would have been destroyed.

The Afghan-Russian Difficulty.

LONDON, July 25. Little progress is being made in negotiations between England and Russia touching the Afghan boundary dispute. The Zulficar Pass question is still undecided, and neither Government seems disposed to yield its claims.

LONDON, July 27. Gen. Komaroff's brother writes to the Government that the conquest of Herat is impossible on account of the great heat.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 28. The Gazette of St. Petersburg states semi-officially that the Marquis of Salisbury on the 22nd inst. requested M. DeGiers, Russian Foreign Minister, to withdraw the claims of Russia to the disputed territory east of Zulficar Pass, and that DeGiers refused point blank.

The Salvation Army's Grand Demonstration

LONDON, July 28. General Booth, of the Salvation Army, has announced a grand parade of the Army in London to-morrow. The object of the demonstration is to influence Parliament, in view of the revelations made by the Pall Mall Gazette, to pass the proposed Criminal Amendment Act, which increases the age of consent in girls from thirteen to eighteen years. The Army will march to the House of Commons, and present that body with a petition signed by 500,000 persons, praying for an immediate reform of English criminal laws relating to the corruption of girls.

A Victory for the Beleaguered Garrison at Kassala.

LONDON, July 28. Mr. Robert Bourke, Under Foreign Secretary, announced in the House of Commons this afternoon that the Government had received news concerning the report that the garrison at Kassala had repulsed El Mahdi's besieging army, killing a great number of the enemy and capturing nearly all their cattle. Mr. Bourke added that the Government was making arrangements to relieve the beleaguered garrison. The statement was received with cheers.

Northwest Items

WINNIPEG, July 28. McKury, who was shot by Indians some distance from the Saskatchewan River, is still living, but his recovery is very doubtful.

Drowned

ST. JOHN, N. B., July 28. Charles O'Brien, a young lad of eighteen years of age, son of Fred. O'Brien, Esq., was drowned last evening while bathing in the St. John River at Indiantown. The body was recovered.

Disabled Steamer

ANNAPOLIS, July 28. While on the passage from Yarmouth to St. John, N. B., the steamer Dominion became disabled, having broken her shaft. She was towed into St. John by a tug boat.

Fortifying Cracow

ST. PETERSBURG, July 28. It is reported that the fortress at Cracow is to have two large iron revolving towers and that the entrenchments and other ramparts are to be added.

OTTAWA, July 28. Jeremiah Travis, Esq., formerly of St. John, N. B., has been appointed Stipendiary Magistrate for the Northwest Territories, and a member of the Northwest Council.

Pownal Notes

Owing to the fine weather and warm rains bestowed on us by the goodness of Providence, the crops in this locality are in an excellent condition and have the appearance of yielding a good harvest. Having fine weather for the past week the farmers are pretty well on with their hay which they find to be as good as usual.

The potatoes also are doing well, and will be a good crop if the bug don't make his appearance. One evening not long since my attention was attracted to a small yacht which shot out from Pownal shore. Its brown sails, which were set to catch the slightest breath of wind, flapped idly against the masts, rather impeding than assisting the work of the rowers. On board the little craft there was a party of nine young Pownal ladies and four young gentlemen of the same place, whose cheerful voices and merry laughter rose up to where I sat with a distinctness almost startling. I watched the boat till she rounded another part of the shore and was hid in darkness. The following sad intelligence was received from Commander Will: "We left Pownal shore about 7 p. m., and enjoyed a pleasant sail for about three hours, with singing on board. But when on our returning home the fishing smack unfortunately grounded on Crown Point Reef, being unable to get ashore, we were obliged to lie in that perilous situation till the returning tide. The night was dark and unusually cold. We had to take off our coats and put them on the ladies who were thinly clad. We then got sails down and huddled ourselves under them. At daybreak a party set out in search of us, but were met at the shore by the fatigued crew of the fishing smack. We were taken to our homes and immediately attended to." The occurrence caused great excitement in the vicinity.
