NEWS NOTES.

The Dominion Government candidate has been elected by acclamation in Quebec Centre.

Gold mining has begun at Koum Secum Guysboro County. It is stated that the prospectors are getting lots of gold.

France seems to be copying the fashions of Austria. The soldiers had to be called in a few days ago to preserve order among the parliamentarians.

The gold production of West Kootenay, B. C., in 1895, was \$2,223,206; in 1896, \$4,002,735. The output of last year is estimated to have been \$3,000,000.

Colonial Sanderson reports that the Transvaal is arming to the teeth, only with the object of attacking Great Britain when a favourable opportunity occurs.

The deputy minister of agriculture at Ottawa has gone to Washington to study the workings of the patent office, with a view to the reorganization of the Canadian patent branch.

As a result of General Booth's visit to Halifax it was decided to form a naval and military league and the poor man's metropole, for which the old sailors' home building is to be purchased.

The Club National refused to censure Mr. Tarte on Friday evening. The minister of Public Works is downing his opponents within his party. In a party like that of the Liberals the man who controls the giving out of the offices has the winner's grip in the wrestle.

Montreal Gazette: Canadians last year smoked 93,800,000 cigarettes, or 13,400,000 more than in 1896. They also drank a tenth of a gallon a head of excised spirits more than they did in 1896. It looks as if a lot of people were fortifying themselves for the prohibition that won't come after the plebiscite.

Seismological (or earth quake) observatories are to be established at Alipore, Madras, and Colaba, at the instance of the Seismological Committee of the British Association for the Advancement of Science, London. An indent has been sent to the Secretary of State for the necessary instruments.

It is reported at Ottawa that F. A. Heinze, the Roseland railway king, is desirous of reopening negotiations with the C. P. R. for the purchase of his road and smelter, as Hon. Mr. Blair told him that the pressure was so strong from the Ontario liberals in favor of an independent line into Roseland that the C. P. R. is bound to get there soon.

Rev. Sam Jones will go to Baltimore to attend the Methodist conference in May, where the question of the status of the evangelist will be discussed. He said recently: "As an evangelist who has raised over \$500,000 for the church and brought more converts into its membership than any other one man in the church, I will ask, as a matter of right, that this question be settled."

The Philadelphia board of education has taken the lead in the matter of hygiene in the public schools. In addition to concurring with school boards elsewhere in forbidding the mixing of the pencils used by the children, it has decided that each pupil be furnished with a drinking cup, that children showing symptoms of illness be sent home, and that schools in districts where infectious diseases exist shall be scrubbed weekly with a solution of carbonic acid.

The mining industry of South Africa as a whole is reported to be satisfactory; the expenses are being lessened, while the profits are increasing; but the public does not like the political outlook in the Transvaal. It has no faith in Paul Kruger; it has no real confidence in substantial reform; and until the corrupt and unrepresentable Government is swept away, no matter how good the mining industry may be, the public's old confidence in the Rand will not return. And without the return of confidence there can be no permanent improvement in prices.

HOCKEY MATCH AT THE RINK LAST NIGHT.

The St. Dunstan's and Prince of Wales hockey teams have met again. And the Princes are the victors. The rink last night resounded with both of the college cries, that of P. W. C., being particularly in evidence. The students of Prince of Wales, especially the young ladies went fairly wild with delight after each successive goal made by their champions, while those of St. Dunstan's were decidedly "down in the mouth" and their stock fell below par almost as soon as play commenced and kept on descending until the end of the game, except for a small jump which it took, when St. Dunstan made their one and only goal. To say that the game was rough would but express it mildly. It was one continuation of sticks being broken, players sprawling on the ice, the referee trying to keep out of the road, and little side fights going on between some or other of the forwards. The puck was bullied shortly after eight by Adams and Sullivan and it was not long before Pickard secured the first goal for the Princes. After some brisk play on both sides, Schaefer from cover point got a good lift and sent the puck flying through the opposite goal posts. Before half time was called Pickard, who was playing a splendid game, scored again. After half time Redmond seemed to think that it was his turn to do some scoring and he shot the remaining four goals for the Princes, G. Roy making the single one for the St. Dunstons. Although neither L. Miller or Adams scored at all, the runs of the former and the steady play of the latter helped considerably. But the St. Dunstons although defeated by six points need not despair. They have in them the making of a much better team than played last night, with the exception of their cover point who seemed to be entirely out of place. He could neither "block" or "lift," the two principal duties of c. p. Their back is, "nearly as good as Bethune." Point played a good game, and the forwards all made good individual rushes but did not work together enough. They want to learn, first of all to manage their skates better, to follow close upon the puck, and to stop slashing. We hope to see these teams meet again, and think that if the Saints practice well together in the meantime, the result will be a little less one sided.
