Eating Lemons.

A good deal has been said through the papers about the healthfulness of lemons. The latest advice is how to use them so they will do the most good, as follows:—Most people know the benefit of lemonade before breakfast, but few know that it is more than doubled by taking another at night also. The way to get the better of the bilious system without blue pills or quinine is to take the juice of one, two or three lemons, as appetite craves, in as much ice water that makes it pleasant to drink without sugar, before going to bed. In the morning, on rising, at least a half-hour before breakfast, take the juice of one lemon in a goblet of water. This will clean the system of humor and bile with efficiency, without any of the weakening effects of calomel or congress water. People should not irritate the stomach by eating lemons clear; the powerful acid of the juice, which is always most corrosive, invariably produces inflammation after a while; but properly diluted so that it does not burn or draw the throat, it does its medical work without harm, and when the stomach is clear of food, over the system thoroughly, says a medical authority.

CURRENT NOTES.

The Bulgarian bishop has been murdered. General Walseley hopes to reach Dongola by the 7th November. Admiral Courbet has been ordered to occupy the island of Hainan. The French consul and merchants have been expelled from Canton. Hawley (liberal) has been elected to the Ontario legislature for Lennox. The Bankers and Merchants Telegraph Company is to be absorbed by the Western Union. The agents of the Cairo and St. Louis Railroad have been in collision and swindling the company. The U. S. consul at Montreal has been reporting to his government on the trade of the Dominion. The Maori King, who has been slightly given to exhilaration, was recently initiated into the Temperance order of Good Templars, in London. The ceremony was performed by the Grand Worthy Chief Templar Malins, assisted by a sister of John Bright.

In 1882 China's volume of trade reached 17,388,852 tons, the largest part of which was carried in English vessels, viz: 61 1/2 per cent. Chinese vessels came next in order, as they carried 26 1/2 per cent., France, 3.55 per cent., Japan, 1.81 per cent., and America, 92 per cent. The total value of Chinese trade in the same year amounted to about \$720,000,000.

The congregation gathered at a school-house near Easton, Ind., on Sunday, the 24 ult., expected to witness the marriage of Miss Annie Poore and Joseph Thompson. The attendance was accordingly large. At the appointed hour Miss Poore appeared in a buggy driven by a young man recognized by many as a former lover. Soon afterwards Thompson arrived in a buggy with the minister, and alighted. Thompson returned without his bride and the minister left without a fee.

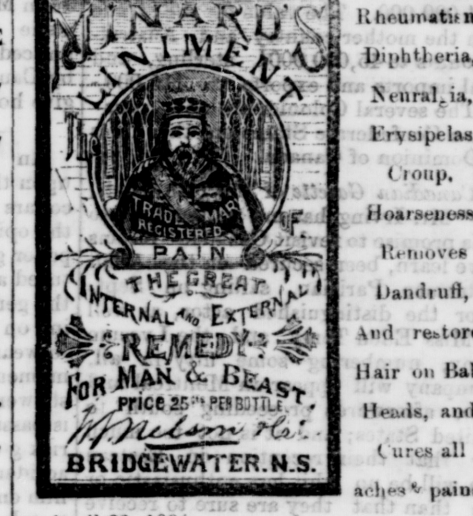
