

Senators Will Stay If New Stadium Is Guaranteed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senators are seriously considering a shift to Los Angeles or San Francisco but are likely to stay put if the capital guarantees to build a new stadium.

This appeared to be the situation Friday as club president Calvin Griffith, in New York for the world series, confirmed reports periodically denied in the past that the American League base-

ball club was thinking of transferring its franchise to the west coast.

He now is pictured as desiring to stay in Washington but is dissatisfied with prospects for the future.

He encountered an objection from the White House. President Eisenhower told his press conference Friday morning he was "agin" the move, Eisenhower said he'd like to see the capital get a new stadium.

Congress has been tinkering with the proposal for 10 years or so, but nothing has crystallized on it.

The Senators own 28,500-capacity Griffith Stadium. For the last two seasons Washington has drawn the lowest attendance in either league—431,647 paid in 1956.

WORLD SERIES NOTES

BROOKLYN (AP) — The New York Yankees manager Casey Stengel sent his pitchers into Friday's world series game with Brooklyn, all he lacked was some flags and a brass band. They would have made it a full-scale parade. The Yankees were out more grass from the bullpen to the pitcher's box than they did running the bases.

The difference between Stengel and Brooklyn manager Walt Alston is striking. When Alston went out to the mound to change pitchers, he looked like the neighborhood undertaker, so soberly did he approach his task. Stengel, on the other hand, carried on a running conversation on the way out to the box. Once he arrived, everyone got a pat on the back and a few words. On the way back to the dugout, he stopped to chat with the umpires, Brooklyn third-base coach Billy Herman and anyone else who happened along.

Plate umpire Hank Soar had his troubles. There were numerous bees. Even Brooklyn first baseman Gil Hodges, normally the most peaceful citizen on New York's Whitey Ford opposes Soar on one of his calls in the

seventh. There were some jeers mixed with the cheers when Brook starter Don Newcombe left the mound. Brooklyn fans still don't think big Newk can win the big ones.

Something obviously is troubling Mickey Mantle. He permitted Duke Snider to go from first to third on Jackie's Robinson's nump back single in the fourth. Snider isn't that fast. The ball "died" when it hit the grass, but Mantle didn't get the jump on it.

NEW YORK (AP) — Another fine day for baseball is the prediction of the weather bureau for the third game of the world series at Yankee Stadium today.

The late-afternoon forecast said "Saturday mostly fair and cool, with temperatures in the 60's." The outlook for Sunday is some cloudiness and slightly warmer.

NEW YORK (AP) — Brooklyn Dodgers, leading New York Yankees two games to none, Friday night were made 9-5 favorites to capture the world series.

The Yankees, however, were the 6-5 favorites to win today's game at the Yankee Stadium if New York's Whitey Ford opposes Brooklyn's Roger Craig.

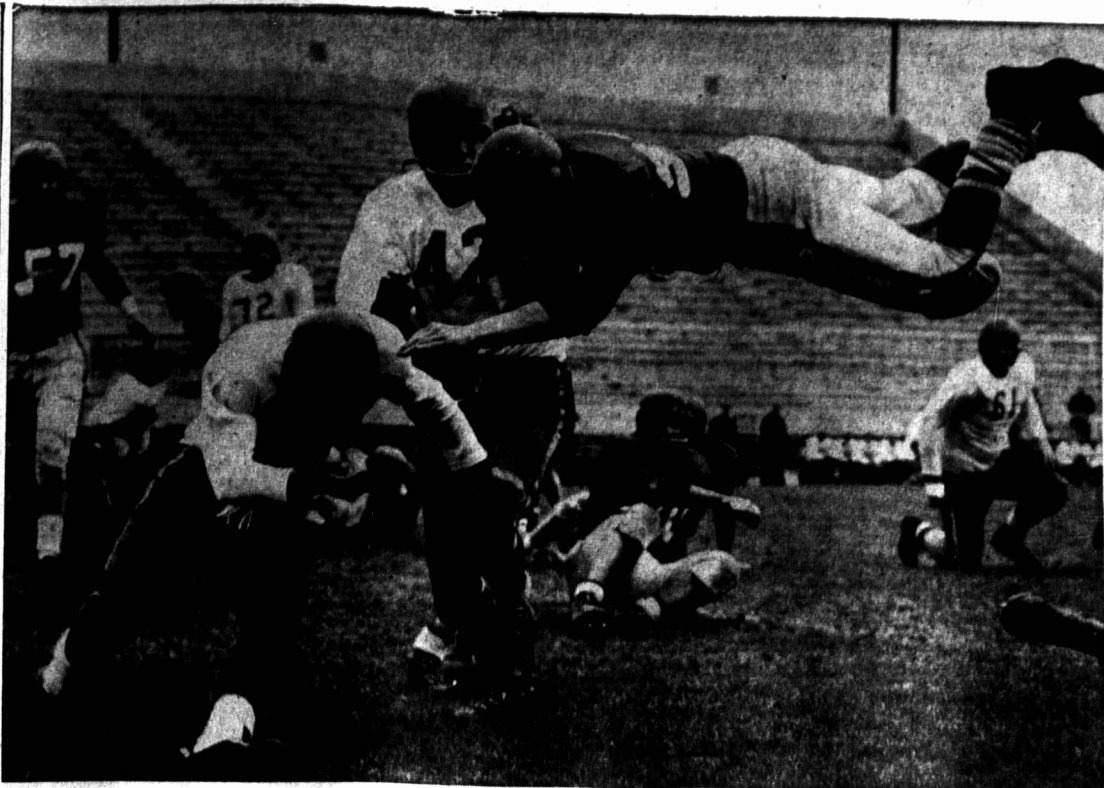

VATICAN CITY (AP) — Pope Innocent XI, a humble man who dared stand against powerful Louis XIV of France, will be beatified Sunday in St. Peter's Basilica.

Centre of the glittering ceremony will be the silver-masked body of the 17th century pope.

Pope Pius XII has given the pontifical robes to clothe the body of Innocent XI, and the papal ring that has been placed on his silver-covered hand. The crystal casket containing the pontiff's body will be exposed at the culminating moment of the solemn and joyful ceremony when the papal brief is read proclaiming Innocent one of the blessed of the Roman Catholic Church.

Pope Pius will come from his Castel Gandolfo summer residence to St. Peter's Basilica to lead in the first act of veneration of the newly beatified pontiff.

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Athletic Commission Lifts Paddy DeMarco's Suspension

NEW YORK (AP) — The New York state athletic commission Friday lifted Paddy DeMarco's indefinite suspension because of his "unblemished record" but warned the former lightweight champion to be careful with whom he associates in the future.

The 28-year-old Brooklyn boxer was suspended Sept. 19 for conduct detrimental to boxing. The commission charged DeMarco had an undercover manager with a criminal record acting for him in violation of commission rules for his Feb. 2 bout with Don Jordan in Los Angeles.

DeMarco and his trainer, Joe Buonocore, testified that Jimmy Knapp of Brooklyn had signed the Los Angeles contract as DeMarco's manager without their knowledge. Both however, had testified that the California commission had insisted that Paddy had to have a manager to get his full purse of \$5,000.

DeMarco, at the hearing Friday on his application to have the suspension lifted, admitted he had not told the truth at the Sept. 19 hearing.

Buonocore, who had been suspended for not appearing at Sept. 19 hearing, also had licence as a second restored.

Wilf Greaves To Make Pro Debut

SPORTS WILF GREAVES EDMONTON (CP) — Middleweight boxer Wilf Greaves makes his Canadian professional debut here Oct. 18 in a 10-round bout against Irvin Steen of York, promoter Pat Giannone Friday.

The former Canadian and Irish Empire amateur middleweight champion turned pro shortly after the Empire Games in Vancouver two years ago.

He had lost two of 11 bouts to Tony Percy, former Canadian welterweight champion, and other to Tiger Jones, a rare middleweight. All bouts have been in the United States.

HUNTERS' CORNER

It Was Hunter's Luck

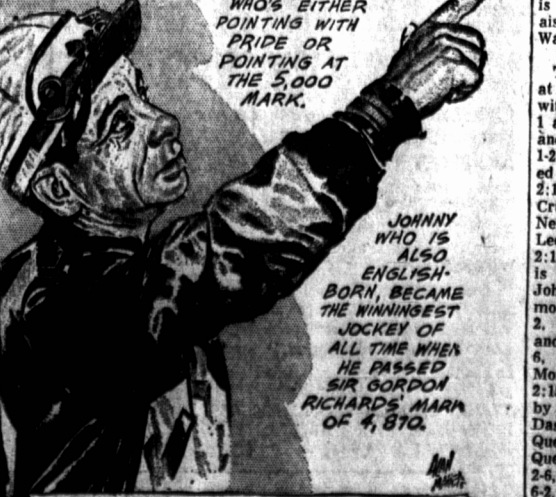
The hunter's Christmas has been relegated to the memory column and as usual some are disappointed with what Santa Claus handed out to them while others still sport a glow from the excitement of the opening day. It was a calm morning, and reception was at a peak, for a shot fired a mile away sounded as if the hunter was a mere hundred yards distant. The wildgeese took their cue from the land barrage that drifted seaward and, with very few exceptions, sat tight on the tidal flats and eel grass beds. The only geese bagged on the opening day by my knowledge were shot at South Lake. Here a party of hunters led the ducks ride with their decoys for an hour or more till a flock of geese sitting outside the rig decided it was safe to join the party and paid a stiff price for their mistake.

Duck hunters had varying luck. A few obtained their daily limit of eight. Father and son teams appeared to get the breaks. At East Lake, C. Roy White, Souris and son Douglas filled their limits of eight each. Reg (Alex) MacDonald and son John, Souris, also shooting at East Lake were runners up with 15. Whenever I hear of duck shooting at East Lake the memory of the late Ned MacPhee, better known as Red Neil, comes to mind. East Lake was Neil's old stamping ground. He was a crack shot and lifted many a limit off its water.

It was the geese that really played a cagey game. Eleven rigs on Cavendish Ridge waited in vain. It was just as well for it would have been all the same trying to break through the famed "Hindenburg Line" in the 1st Great War. Sound carried far on the opening morning. Hunters told me that ducks that alighted on a marsh or lake after daybreak took to wing again when shots were fired two miles away. At 9:00 a.m. large "riffs" of ducks could be seen resting safe and secure on the placid off-shore waters.

Hunters are reporting varying luck with Hungarian partridge. I have followed the fortunes of one party of three very closely. On Monday the geese refused to cooperate and on Tuesday they switched to Huns. They worked tirelessly but it was 4:20 p.m. before they got a covey moving. Farmers reported coveys on their premises but until late afternoon had to wait until next Saturday.
