

CURRENT NOTES.

Grave fears have arisen that small-pox will become epidemic in St. Paul. "To jarret," meaning "to abduct," has made its appearance in English journals.

St. Peter's Cathedral, just finished at Moscow, has five cupolas, and 900 pounds of gold was used in overlaying in them. The doors of the temple cost \$320,000 and the marble floors \$1,500,000.

"Eh, doctor," said a baillie of a small Scotch town to a friend, "he maun have been an extraordinary man, that Shakespeare. There are things he come into his head that never would have come into mine at a'."

Australian colonies, with 3,000,000 population, have 76,000,000 sheep, producing annually \$75,000,000 worth of fine wool. The cost of keeping sheep, is probably less in Australia than in any country in the world.

A cynical observer says that the main idea of English journalism seems to be to say everything in the duldest possible way, and the main idea of American journalism seems to be to say nothing in the smartest possible way.

It is generally expected that Mr. W. H. Howland will be a candidate for the Mayoralty of Toronto, this year. He will be brought out by the temperance people, but will be extensively supported on his merits as an energetic and competent business man.

How milking is done in the Island of Jersey is thus described:—"Tall buckets, narrowed near the top, with widened mouths, are used. A linen cloth is tied over the top, then a smooth sea-shell is pushed down into the depression to receive the milk. The shell prevents the wearing of the cloth by the streams of milk. When the milking is done the straining is also completed."

A German critic thus distinguishes between ridicule, wit, irony and humor: "Ridicule is the wit of a stupid or vulgar person; wit the ridicule of a superior intellect or a man of the world; irony the wit of a thinker, and humor the irony of a poet. Ridicule is like a blow with the fist, wit like the prick of a needle, irony like the sting of a thorn, and humor the plaster which heals all these wounds."

We learn that Lieut. Cartwright, son of Sir Richard Cartwright, and Lieut. Pelletier, son of Senator Pelletier, have been appointed to positions in the new Infantry Schools, at Winnipeg. Both gentlemen, we believe, are graduates of the Royal Military College, Kingston. We are pleased to notice that in making such appointments to the schools, the work of the college is recognized by the Government, and that political considerations are not allowed to influence the consideration of claims.

John Bright has written a letter to Blennerhasset, who is contesting Manchester for the House of Commons, condoling with him on the opposition of the Irishmen of that city, who have joined the Tories instead of supporting the Liberals. The Tories, Bright says, have refused to grant concession to Ireland, while the Liberals are willing to remove her grievances. England, he continues, has in the past treated Ireland cruelly, but now Ireland's greatest enemies are her professed leaders, who incite her people to disturb the peace.

Surely the world moves when a Rector of the Church of England can be found using such language as the following, which the Rev. Thomas Norton, of Wychling, embodied in a speech he lately delivered on the state of things in England:—"The great guns of the Church are opposed to Liberalism, but the big names are not of much use. They don't represent the Church—at least they don't represent me. I don't see why there ought to be such a difference between the Church and other denominations. I say if you can't stand on your own base you have no right to stand at all. As to extraordinary tithes, I would abolish them as rank, down-right robbery. We were talking about great guns just now. What voice have you in electing the Vicar at Ashford? Why, none at all. As a Liberal, I think we ought to disestablish and, if necessary, disendow the Church. I don't think the Church requires money in that sense, to ensure good spiritual teaching. Why, the commonest savage could put us to shame in that way."
