Montreal Markets.

(Montreal Gazette of Friday 12th)

CHEESE.

The excitement in cheese instead of sub-
siding, appears to be on the increase, as is
evidenced by the very strong tone of the
market. So far as can be seen, however,
the excitement is all on this side, there
being no responsive movement in Liver-
pool, from which it would appear that
speculation has got a good deal among our
cheese men. In this market the tone was
strong, but business was not active. An-
other advance of 1c. per lb. was paid, a lot
of 1,000 boxes changing hands at 7c. with
further business rumored at that figure.
New York to-day was strong and higher at
7 to 7 1/2c., so that there is general
strength all along the line. The market
seems to have started on the up grade
almost as rapidly as it came down, and as
the stock to arrive will be nearly all grass,
which is much superior in point of quality
to the half-and-half goods sold for shipment
this week, no lower prices need be antici-
pated for several weeks, more especially as
factorymen have got their ideas up. At
Brockville to-day there was something like
a block, and the few sales made were at an
advance of one cent from last market.
Buyers ostensibly were anxious to buy,
but it had more of an appearance of a deli-
berate attempt to rig the market than
anything else. If the idea were to make
factorymen hold it will be measurably suc-
cessful, but the facts will probably leak out
later. The prices paid at Brockville were
7c. and 7 1/2c., against 5 1/2c. and 6 1/2c. last
week, and 9c. and 9 1/2c. at this date last
year. Cable offers made yesterday met
with but faint response, and many shippers
could not get an order, which shows how
matters stand over there. Beerbohm
cables Liverpool at 36s. 6d., which is 6d.
lower than the public cable. We quote fine
to finest 6 1/2c. and 7 1/2c., and medium to good
5 1/2c. and 6 1/2c. Last year at this date fine
to finest were selling at 9c. and 9 1/2c.

SUGAR, SYRUP AND MOLASSES.

The sugar market has been quiet, with
the feeling less firm, although there is no
apparent effort to force sales. Foreign
markets show a reaction from the highest
points, but the latest advices report a firm
feeling. Business during the week has been
quiet at nominally unchanged values. An
active demand has sprung up for syrup,
of which a large turnover has been made at
1 1/2c. to 3c. per lb. Molasses continues dull
and nominally.

THE CATTLE MARKET.

Receipts of exports of cattle have been
insufficient for the demand, and a good
clearance has fallen off, which has made
the receipts has fallen off, which has made
an apparent reduction in quotations. There
was an active demand from exporters at
Point St. Charles this morning, and all the
offerings were taken at 5c. to 5 1/2c. per lb.,
live weight, and we quote 5c. to 6c., the
latter for choice animals. Hogs were in
good supply and steady at 5 1/2 to 5 1/4 c. per
lb. Export sheep were quoted at 4c. per
lb., live weight. Cattle space have been
taken at 60s. to Liverpool and 50s. to
Glasgow. At Viger market the receipts of
cattle were fair.

Boston Markets.

BOSTON, June 13.

POTATOES.—The market is steady at
previous quotations, with a fair demand for
desirable stock. Rose range from 50c. to
60c. per bush. Choice Prolifics run up to
63 to 65c. per bush. New Southern are not
desirable, and rule quiet at \$4 to \$4 50 per
bbl. We quote:

Eggs.—An advance of 1c. per dozen has
been established on the best marks, with
sales of Eastern extra at 14 and 14 1/2c. and
Northern and Provincial at 13 1/2 and 14c.
per dozen. Buyers do not respond freely
to the advance and the market closes quiet.
We quote: P. E. Island, 13 1/2 and 14c.

OATS.—There has been a moderate de-
mand, and prices are easier. No. 2 white
have sold at 42 1/2c.; and No. 3 white at 42c.
No. 1 white and barley are scarce, and
range from 46 and 48c. per bushel.

It is stated that at the present time nearly
20,000 acres of land are uncultivated in
Berkshire, in the neighborhood of Lam-
bourne, Eng., and within sixty miles of
London. It has hitherto cost as much to
convey corn from Lambourne to London as
from Chicago to London, but it is hoped
that this state of things will be remedied by
the opening of a new line of railway which
will run through the district.

The New Premier and Chancellor.

Right Honorable Robert Arthur Gas-
coigne Cecil, K. C., Marquis of Salisbury,
is the eldest surviving son of the second
marquis. He was born at Hatfield in 1830,
and was educated at Eton and Christ
Church, Oxford, where he graduated in
1853, in the same year. At the age of
twenty-three, he was elected to the
Commons from the Borough of Stamford,
in the Conservative interest. He con-
tinued to hold the seat until he succeeded
to the Marquisate by the death of his
father in 1868. He married in 1857 a
daughter of Sir Edward Hall Alderson,
Baron of the Exchequer. He took an
active part while in the Commons, in
all public measures which affected
the established church, and was
also a frequent contributor to the
Quarterly Review and other periodicals. His
first official position was that of Secretary
of State for India, in Lord Derby's third
administration, 1866. This post he resign-
ed in the following year. He was elected
Chancellor of the University of Oxford in
1868 in succession to the Earl of Derby.
He was again appointed Secretary for India
under Mr. Disraeli in 1874. He was also
sent as special Ambassador to Constanti-
nople, in the matter of difference between
the Porte and Russia. At the following
conference of the powers he was the leading
spirit, and distinguished himself. In April,
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
