A MISLEADING STATEMENT.

Sir,—In your issue of 11th, just to hand, you copy from the Pioneer a statement of the wonderful work the Emerald Cheese factory has done during the past season. If the Pioneer had analyzed that statement before publishing it to the country, they might have seen that it was misleading in stating that the gross proceeds of sale, instead of the net proceeds, were distributed to the patrons. For instance 97,630 lbs cheese sold for \$8,224.80, or 3.42 cents per lb. which could not possibly net the patrons over 55 cents per 100 lbs. of milk while the Pioneer's statement says, they got 80.41 cents per 100. Such mis-statements cause the patrons of other factories to believe that they have not received as much from their factory as they ought to, and have a tendency to cause dissatisfaction.

SEASONABLE RECIPES.

For Coughs.—Put a teaspoonful of flax seed into an enameled saucepan with a quart of boiling water, then place on the fire and boil slightly; pour back into the pitcher, and after sweetening it well and adding a little lemon juice if liked, cover it carefully.
