STEAMER'S MOVEMENTS.—The Campana arrived from Montreal last evening with a general cargo and a number of passengers. She left last night for Pictou, and will return to Summerside on Tuesday morning sailing thence to Montreal. About 3000 cases of cheese were shipped from here for cold storage at Montreal.

FIRE CHAMBER CO. WINS AGAIN.—Montreal Aug. 20. In the action brought against L. H. Rousseau & Co., for \$5000 damages for selling and offering for sale Textile Buckskin as Fibre Chambray. The Hon. Mr. Justice Teller of the Superior Court has rendered judgment in favor of the Company's application for a temporary injunction and has retained the defendants Clerks, Agents etc., from selling Textile Buckskin or any other imitation of Fibre Chambray as Fibre Chambray.

DESTROYING THE CROPS.—Farmers living along the banks of the Kennebecasis in King's county are complaining of the ravages of a new grub. It has made its appearance this year for the first time, and has completely destroyed the grass along the bank between Rollins and Hampton. It has torn out the roots of the grass, causing the blade to fall and wither. Some idea of the ravages of this pest may be gathered from the fact that a farmer who cuts about 25 tons of hay will not get more than 5 tons this year.—Ch. Guenot Post

SUPPOSED TO BE DROWNED.—The Guardian says that a man and a boy belonging to Egmont Bay—the former named Joseph Arsenault, a married man, aged 30 years, and the latter named Pamille Gallant, 15 years of age—were supposed to have been drowned off Egmont Bay shore on Wednesday afternoon. They were out in a boat taking in lobster traps when they were struck by a heavy squall and have not been seen since. A boat said to belong to Arsenault and a few things that were in the boat have since been found. But there are no tidings of the men or the boat.
