Rev. E. M. Malone Marks Diamond Jubilee As Priest

The Parish of St. Peter's Cathedral marked the diamond jubilee of the ordination of Canon E.M. Malone, MA, DD, to the priesthood at a reception in the church hall Saturday night. The occasion was also observed at a special service of the Holy Eucharist Saturday morning.

Thomas N. Rogers, chairman of the Vestry Committee, presided at the reception. A letter of congratulations from Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth was read by Archdeacon J.R. Davies and a letter from the Rt. Rev. William Davis, archbishop of the Diocese of Nova Scotia, noted that Canon Malone, throughout his career, has contributed service and leadership in many fields of church and academic life.

Canon Malone replied briefly to the many expressions of good wishes and recalled experiences in the earlier years of his priesthood.

The Ladies Guild of the church served refreshments a feature of which was a table displaying a large anniversary cake.

Canon Malone began his academic career in Antigua, B.W.I. and proceeded to the degree of MA at Durham University. He began his ministry in Charlottetown in 1921.

On his ordination to the priesthood on February 26, 1906, Canon Malone became priest-in-charge of the British Virgin Islands and master of a small boys school in St. Thomas.

RECTOR IN MONTSERRAT

From 1906 to 1911 he was rector of St. Peter's, Montserrat. In the later years he became vicar of St. Saviour's, Barbados. He was appointed curate of St. Michael's Cathedral from 1918 to 1921. He also acted as a prison chaplain and a chaplain to police during years of World War One.

Canon Malone's last appointment before coming to Charlottetown was as vicar to St. Paul's, Barbados.

He was made a canon of St. Peter's in 1926, and later also a canon of All Saints Cathedral, Halifax. He retired from St. Peter's in June of 1952. Appointed examining chaplain to Bishop Hackettley, he retired from that office in 1953.

Canon Malone was chaplain to the artillery in 1936, his commission of captain being granted by King Edward VII. During World War Two he was chaplain to the Canadian Army Basic Training Centre at P.E.I.

Canon Malone was given the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity by Kings College in 1951 and served as lecturer at King's from 1952 to 1954.

He was dean of residence and lecturer at St. Chad's College, Regina, in 1955-56.

Canon Malone served as elected representative of the Diocese for many years, both on general and provincial synods, and was also a member of the Committee of Revision of the new Prayer Book.

CNR Snow Plows Busy Clearing Rails

Canadian National Railway snow plows were busy clearing rails Sunday in the eastern and western sections of P.E.I. after one of the worst blizzards of the season swept the province Friday night and Saturday morning.

One plow was dispatched Sunday morning at 8:30 for the Murray Harbour area where clearing operations were carried out most of the day.

The other plow, dispatched at noon to the western section of the island, was busy clearing rails between Summerside and Tignish.

Both ferries were back on schedule late Saturday morning and were making good crossings yesterday, reported a spokesman for CNR.

The Charlottetown Radio range reported a total snow fall accumulation of 24 inches from 8 p.m. Friday to 7 p.m. Saturday.

The highest winds recorded were east north east at 68 miles per hour and the lowest temperature was 25.1 degrees at 2 a.m.

Practically all island roads were reported blocked Saturday morning with heavy drifting reported by the department of highways.

drifting was quite severe while other portions received only a slight amount of snow.

A spokesman for Eastern Provincial Airways said flights were cancelled Saturday but resumed Sunday morning.

Island Motor Transport reported that all schedules operated Saturday with the exception of the run from Charlottetown to Summerside and Tignish. The bus from Tignish was half an hour late last night and reports poor in the western section due to narrow cuttings.

The weather office in Summerside reported a total snowfall of 14 inches. Peak winds were 55 gusting to 80 miles per hour at 4 a.m. Saturday.

The government garage in Summerside reported main roads open by Sunday evening but machines were still busy Sunday evening widening main highways and secondary roads.

One of the worst trouble spots in Prince County was in the vicinity of Albany Saturday afternoon and evening where three plows, working continuously, were having great difficulty in keeping the roads open with the snow drifting in as fast as it was being cleared. There were many similar spots across the island but again, in other areas roads were clear for miles.

The extent of the injuries suffered by Dorthetha Coode were not available. There was no estimate of damage given.

Treasury Man Here On Tour

Mr. P.M. Roddick, Secretary of the Preparatory Committee on Collective Bargaining in the Public Service arrived in the city last night in the course of a week-long tour of the Atlantic Region in behalf of the Federal Treasury Board. Hovercraft's Inventor Quits

LONDON (AP) — Christopher Cockerell, 55, inventor of the hovercraft, announced Sunday night his resignation from the board of Hovercraft Development Ltd. because of differences over research and development policies.

Cockerell, a veteran in transport development, executed the original idea for the hovercraft, a boat that skims over the water on an air cushion and now is used in many ports around the world.

He has several times complained of insufficient British government support for hovercraft development and has also objected to licensing hovercraft builders in the United States and Japan in return for down payments and royalties. In a statement issued Sunday night, he called this "helping our worst competitors into the business."
